WASHINGTON IS TWICE LOSER

SOUTHPAWS FAIL
The southpaws have disappointed during the first month of the major league races.

Eddie Collins commended the fact that he had only one partner, Mike Cowgton, and there was a question as to whether he would be able to play as a regular.

So far Collins has gotten a good break in this respect. His capable right-handed pitching staff has kept his club in the first division.

FORM REVERSAL
Last season at this time, Yoda, the youthful southpaw of the Pirates, was the sensation of the National League. This year he turned in only one win in his first six starts.

During the first month of play, the veteran Cooper, one of the crutched southpaws in the business was unable to win a single ball game for his new club, the Chicago Cubs.

A similar condition exists in the American with a few exceptions. On the whole the work of the southpaws has not come up to the expectations of most of the managers.

Last season there was an epidemic of southpaw pitching and it was uniformly successful. In the world series, southpaws were very much the whole thing, particularly from a Washington standpoint.
