## Rail Hearing Asked.

SALEM, Or.—The public service commission petitioned the interstate commerce commission to reopen the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific railroad case insofar as the proceeding affects the railroad map of Oregon.

The action was taken, it was said, so that if the application of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific for a permit to extend their roads to Klamath Falls is granted the interstate commerce commission may order a joint and common-use of the present uncompleted line.

In connection with filing the petition, the public service commission issued a statement that it would be derelict in its duty to the public if it should by acquiescence or in-advertence permit a repetition of the "tinaco" in 1911 and 1912 when two lines of railroad were permitted to duplicate construction up the Deschutes river to Bend.

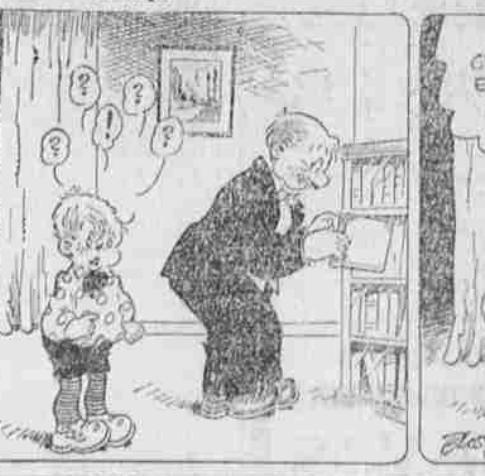
