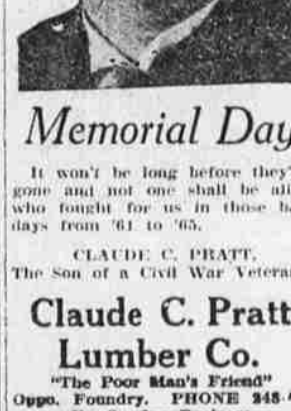

### Venturesome Aviator Winging Long Flight Over Sea and Land

ROME, (AP)—The attempt of Marquis Francesco De Pinedo to pilot a hydroplane across Europe, India, Japan, China and Australia has the double purpose of demonstrating that hydroplanes are better suited than land planes for long distance commercial flying, and of proving to the world that Italy is justified in her claim to be the country of the Old World most like the United States in her confidence in youth, action, daring and cool efficiency.

De Pinedo is typical of a rising generation of Italians who are challenging Anglo-Saxon superiority in sports and in achievements which require the out-of-doors, temperance, hitherto considered given only to non-Latins. A son of a noble Neapolitan family, 35 years old and an expert a specimen of physical vigor as any in Italy, he previously already has a long record of brilliant military and aeronautical achievements. During the war he won four medals of valor, and distinguished himself by bringing to his work a temperament which combined the typically Mediterranean ardor with the supposedly northern qualities of poise and steady judgment.

Many long distance flights during the past few years, including one from Barcelona to Naples and one from Brindisi to Constantinople, convinced De Pinedo that the hydroplane was best suited in point of economy and lack of dependence on supply bases for long trips.

Finally he decided to attempt his present flight, obtaining support for his scheme from the government and particularly from Premier Mussolini, with whom he is personally friendly. On the request by the Italian government, 11 nations furnished him with information about his prospective route, Greece, Turkey, England, Holland, Portugal, United States, Japan, China, France, Persia and Siam.

For the most of the distance De Pinedo, accompanied by mechanic Campanelli, will follow water and will have no special supply bases. It is his theory that he can rely on the natives for aid in an emergency.

The route as mapped out comprises 73 laps and a total of 325 flying hours. The aviator hopes that his excellent nervous system will permit him to fly ten hours daily.
