REPORT MADE TO ASSEMBLY

COLUMBUS, O. (AP)—The annual report of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions was presented to the Presbyterian general assembly session here. It declares the work in the past year encouraging, with cost-benefit and the contribution for it more than in any previous year in the history of the church except one when a large deficit was noted.

The total contributions for the year were \$4,422,724.74, according to the report. This includes \$1,192,344.57 from the churches, \$1,257,414.34 from societies and young people's societies, \$178,742.11 from Sunday schools, \$192,932.49 from individuals, and \$214,587.68 from legations. The net income from securities and cash deposits was \$127,989.92. Other credits, including foreign exchange receipts and savings on the common funds, etc., brought the total income up to \$4,722,121.67. After paying \$2,497.57, the balance of the deficit left over from the previous year, there was \$4,641,601.23 available for the work of the missions and for administration and promotion purposes.

Twenty years ago the total receipts of the board were only a little over \$1,000,000, the report declares. The \$2,000,000 mark was passed in 1905, the \$3,000,000 mark in 1910, and the \$4,000,000 mark the following year.

Presbyterian missionaries are at work in the following countries: Mexico, Guatemala, Colombia, Venezuela, Chile, Brazil, Cameroon in West Africa, Syria, Mesopotamia, Persia, India, China, the Philippines, China, Korea and Japan. In these countries there are 1443 missionaries, men and women, conducting evangelistic, educational, medical, industrial and social service work.

One of the objectives of missionary work is to bring the national churches in the several countries to complete self support and self-control. The report goes on to say in some countries national churches have already been organized and are not under the administrative control of the American church.

The total contributions by the national churches during the past year amount to \$2,596,534. When it is remembered that the 1924 annual report of the Board of Foreign Missions is being presented this year, the growth in contributions during those years will be appreciated and the fact that the national churches are recognizing their responsibility. The time has not yet come to withdraw missionaries from any country, or to stop sending missionaries. The national churches are continuing to request them. But more and more the missionary becomes a helper, adviser and trainer of the national workers.

The problems which the missionaries and the board are facing are chiefly due to the increase of the work. The growth of the church, the demands for medical education, and the desire for physical healing demand a larger force of missionaries than the board has been able to appoint.
