# Pendleton Wins Golf Tourney Here

## LA GRANDE IN THIRD PLACE

Pendleton Boy makes the Best Showing of Tournament for 36 Holes with a 168.

The La Grande team finished third in the inter-city golf tournament played on the local course Saturday and Sunday. The issue was in doubt to the last with the Pendleton team beating the Walla Walla representatives by 202 points during the last few holes of play.

The teams finished with Pendleton first with a total of 6793 points, Walla Walla second with 5543 points, La Grande third with 522 and Baker fourth with 507 points.

A feature of the tournament was the brilliant playing of A. C. Albert, 17 year old golf prodigy with the Pendleton team and one of the most consistent performers who has ever played on the La Grande course.

Young Albert was low medalist with a total of 168 strokes for the 36 holes of play, an average of 4.2 to every nine holes. A. H. Patterson of the Baker team, considered quite a veteran in comparison with the youthful Albert, took one stroke and finished his 28 holes in 182. Other low scores were made by A. H. Patterson of Baker who shot a 174, G. L. Larson of La Grande 175, George Hartman of Pendleton 176 and Brook Dixon of Pendleton 177.

E. J. McMonahan of Pendleton was high point man of the meet with a total of 68 points. McMonahan shot a 182 score but was high point man due to the difference in his competition.

Best net scores for each team were made by Ira H. Hixon of Baker, A. A. Albert of Pendleton, Dorsey Baker of Walla Walla and G. L. Larson of La Grande.

**League Leaders Not Menaced in Past Week**

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Discarded favorites in the major leagues Sunday night had become potent factors in the pennant races after a tumultuous seventh week during which their bludgeons dealt telling blows at the champion Washington and New York teams.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, Boston Braves and Detroit Tigers, all recent tenants of last place, led the revolt. With seven straight triumphs over the fading St. Louis and Chicago clubs the Mack-chief crew marched from fifth place to where they seriously threaten the Giants, whose place as leader of the Nationals was threatened for the first time this season.

It remained for the poorly rateding all existing records for the event Peter De Paolis, youthful racing star and nephew of the famous Ralph De Palma, Saturday won the greatest race ever staged on the Indianapolis motor speedway, when he piloted his little cream-colored racing creation to victory in 4:56:39.47. De Paolis set the remarkable average of 101.13 miles an hour for the 500-mile grind.
