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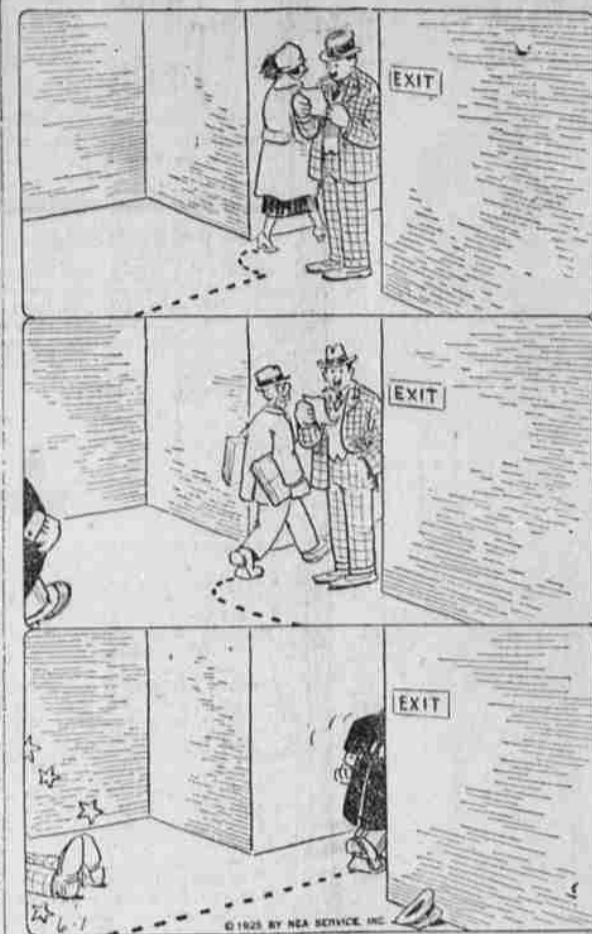

Agonizing Torture Pictured in "Fighting Blade"

Medieval history chronicles many of the most excruciating tortures as the world has ever known. One of the most agonizing of these is pictured in one of the sequences of John S. Robertson's production, "The Fighting Blade," a First National picture in which Richard Barthelmess is starred and which is now being presented at the Arcade theatre.

Richard Barthelmess is victim of this torture. His role in the picture is that of Karl Von Horstenbroock, a Flemish nobleman of fortune whose fame as a duelist precedes him in England, whither he comes to avenge the death of his sister. He vanquishes his foe, and friends of the latter, members of the Cavalry party, plot his death. He joins Oliver Cromwell's party, the Round-heads, who are determined upon the overthrow of Charles I. and thus becomes the enemy of all Cavaliers.

Falling into the hands of some of these, he is manacled with huge heavy wristbands, and wedges are driven with hammer blows between his wrists and these manacles—the noble gentleman performing this task with great ease. And the youth's suffering is so realistic that the spectator shudders. It is their purpose to give him ten days in which to repent, two agonizing days, then to execute him. What happens to defeat their purpose, and how, far from breaking the youth's spirit, this torture makes him the scourge of the Royalist party, is depicted on the screen more forcibly than it can be described.

Princess Will Occupy Scotch Castle in Fall

ABERDEEN, (AP)—News that Aberdeenside Castle is to be "loaned" to Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles next autumn has created a favorable impression in Scotland, there being much disappointment last year because of the absence of the princess from the Decade Gatherings. Aberdeenside, close to Halmoral, sits like a toy castle among the peaks and gins of the Dees country, and has numerous memories of the late King Edward, who frequently stayed there when he was Prince of Wales. Aberdeenside Castle, in fact, has been so linked with various members of the royal family who have spent much time there during the last 80 years or so that many persons regard it as being a royal residence, although as a matter of fact it is not. Aberdeenside actually is rented from the Gordon estate, the owners, by the royal family. It was largely due to an earlier generation of the Gordons that Queen Victoria first went to Halmoral, "this dear Paradise," she called it, and turned that part of the highlands into "Royal Deeside."

Novel Diet for Young Dogs Gives Surprising Results

LONDON, (AP)—Pups thrive on fruit salad, is a discovery made by A. E. Kennard, a veterinary surgeon. He first experimented on a litter of Borzoi, feeding half of them on the usual dog foods and the others on a diet consisting partly of oranges, apples and bananas.

"At the end of three months," said Mr. Kennard, "the latter were noticeably in advance, physically, of their brothers, and the eventual result of the experiment was that the fruit salad pups all became first-class hounds, whereas only three of those fed on meat, fish and biscuit grew into good dogs. One died and two others developed rickets."

The experiment was repeated with Pomeranians, and in three months the fruit-fed Poms grew almost beyond recognition into the size of large (ex-terriers). When distemper attacked the fruit-fed puppies it passed off like a bad cold.
