MORE LOGGERS ARE LAID OFF

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special)—With the laying off of several hundred more loggers last week, employment in the logging industry of the west coast continued its downward trend, according to the U. S. weekly employment service letter issued here today. The letter indicates that the percentage of logging is more pronounced in the Grays Harbor and Puget Sound districts than elsewhere. Sawmill operation, the letter states, has for the most part been returned to a six-day week basis.

River drives in the pine country east of the Cascades are coming to an end, sawmills and camps there are reasonably active and very few men are out of employment, the letter states. Condensed reports from the various districts follow:

PORTLAND—Papers and buckers are being laid off at several more camps in this district and the Beaver Creek Logging company has shut down. Local sawmills are now operating six days per week. A night shift has been added at the Coble & Mitchell mill, Valsetz. It is reported, Labor turnover in camps and sawmills is very light.

ABERDEEN—Despite the fact that several hundred loggers have been laid off at Grays Harbor camp during the past ten days, there are few unemployed men in the city. The Lytle Logging company closed its camps last week and Camp 3 of the Wynoochee Timber company is down. The Independence Logging company, a four-side operation, shut down May 30. There has been no change in sawmill operation here. The Harbor Plywood company, a new concern at present employing 85 men and women in the manufacture of veneer, began operation last week. The chain packing season on Grays Harbor has come to an end.

SEATTLE—The number of unemployed in Seattle was materially increased during the past week and new jobs have been fewer. More fallers and buckers have been laid off at Puget Sound camps. Sawmill operation here, for the most part, has been returned to a six-day week. Demands for help from farms and dairies have been negligible. A few strawberry pickers have been sent to jobs from Seattle but local help in the various berry districts is doing most of the work.

EYRETT—A large number of logging companies are preparing to close down for indefinite periods. All local sawmills are running to a six-day week and one has added a second shift. There are few jobs offered at local employment offices and there are few men out of work.

BELLINGHAM—With the reopening of the E. K. Wood sawmill here, giving employment to about 150 men, and the opening of the Biordi-Donovan Lumber Mills' new box factory, there has been an improvement in the local labor situation, although in the near future several logging camps will curtail or shut down altogether. The St. Paul & Tacoma camp is now operating but one side and the Puget Sound Sawmills' camp has been closed. Wuerkin Bros. and Hoff & Pinkey have resumed logging. At the Utah-Idaho Sugar company's factory 140 men are employed and men will soon be needed in the sugar beet fields for thinning.

SPOKANE—All skilled sawmill help in this district seems to be employed. Night shifts have been added to two more large plants. The Priest river drive finished last week and the Humboldt Lumber company has closed its two camps in that district. Railroads here are still calling for a few men for construction work. Haying will start next week and orders for men already are being received.

BEAUTY QUEENS OF RIO STRIVE FOR ODD PRIZES

RIO DE PANERIO (AP)—The business men of this city apparently believe that pretty girls in Brazil are a big different. One of the local newspapers is running a beauty contest, with some unusual prizes being offered by local commercial firms.

There are, of course, the usual premiums of talcum powder, toilet sets and perfume, but some of the others are difficult to harmonize with the prevalent belief that the Brazilian girl does no work, and never goes out unless accompanied by a member of the family.

Included in the list of prizes is a repeating rifle, a bicycle, a gas stove, an ice chest, a typewriter, 50 safety razor blades, a lottery

ticket, and 25 collections of love stories.

The photographs already published have not included any contestants who seem to be in need of such a large supply of razor blades and the motive behind the donation is unexplainable, except on the theory that the girls with bouffed hair are in the habit of shaving their necks.

JARGON OF CAMEL DRIVERS PERVADES SPEECH OF ARAB

LONDON (AP)—In the Arabic language there are nearly 6000 words descriptive of the camel and its various offshoot, according to Lieutenant Colonel H. P. Jacob, formerly in Cairo as political adviser to Lord Allenby, British high commissioner in Egypt, who lectured re-

cently before the London chamber of commerce on his experiences in Egypt.

Col. Jacob told of being captured by tribesmen while proceeding to Sonta, capital of the Iman Yahya, as government envoy to that monarch. The tribesmen kept the colonel prisoner four months. They feared he intended completing a treaty which would place the

entire country under Iman's sway.

The British government offered \$250,000 for his ransom which the tribesmen scorned, and eventually he got away by concluding a temporary agreement with them.

In his description of Arabic and its connection with the camel Col. Jacob asserted the guttural sounds of that language were said by linguists to have been derived from

the gurglings of the head of burdock of the deserts.

Movies Cure Sea-Sickness Latest Claim of Hollywood

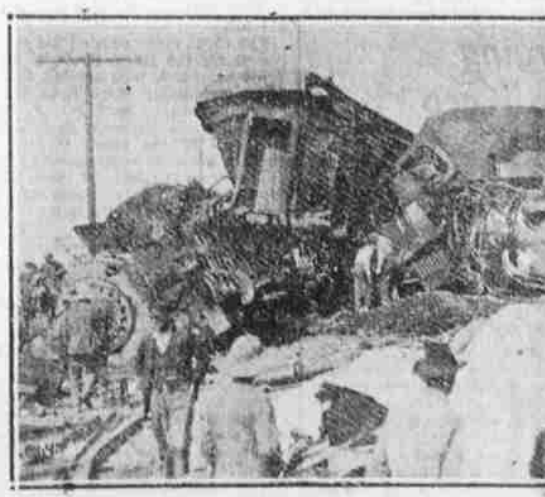
HOLLYWOOD, Cal. (AP)—An experiment in the lining of moving pictures for exhibition on ocean passenger liners as a cure for sea-sickness among passengers, is being conducted here by Robert G. Vignola, a director.

The cause of sea-sickness, the director declares, is largely visual, predicated on the shifting planes which characterize the motion of a ship. The larger ocean passenger carriers are now equipped with exhibition cameras and screens and it is Vignola's belief that pictures can be made for exhibition on shipboard which will counteract the effect of the ship's motion and save the most susceptible passenger from the horrors of mal de mer.
