**Hints for the Housewife**  
STRAWBERRY JUICE FOR SUMMER PUNCH

The housewife who wishes to serve an unusual drink during the summer months will prepare strawberry juice before the season closes. A little juice of this plump berry adds a delightful color and flavor to any fruit drink.

Heat three cups of sugar and one cup of water in an enameled ware saucepan. Add two cups of strawberries and boil ten minutes. Mash the strawberries in the syrup so that all the juice will be extracted. Then let cool. Enameled ware is impervious to the action of fruit acids so there will be no danger of the fruit becoming affected or discolored. Have bottles or jars ready, heat the fruit again, and seal while hot.

A very good punch is made of strawberry, pineapple, lemon and orange juice, strong tea and water, with either white hick beer or ginger ale added just before serving.

**Motor Vehicles Number Days**  
Of Horse-Drawn Cabs in Berlin

BERLIN (AP)—The days of the horse-drawn cab in Berlin appear to be numbered and with its passing will go an historic institution of Old Berlin. Time was when the different colored "movepips" worn by the drivers indicated whether the cab was first, second or third class. Now there is only one class, and that is thoroughly dilapidated.

The few remaining cabbies are well beyond 40 and their numbers will not increase as new licenses are issued only to motor driven vehicles. Owners of the horse cabs have a hard time making a living as there is little call for their vehicles except at the arrival of trains, when all the automobiles and taxicabs are engaged.

## Sister Mary's Kitchen

beef hash, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

Lullabeen—Baked hominy, broiled ham or bacon, water cross, blue barb tiplica, bran bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Veal cutlets with tomato sauce, baked potatoes, beet greens, jellied vegetable salad, chocolate bread pudding, granham bread, milk, coffee.

Crisp broiled bacon should be served to children under school age in place of ham for luncheon. The cross should be finely minced and seasoned with lemon juice and oil. Vinegar should not be served to children under 10 years of age but lemon juice being rich in the elusive vitamins should be used with a hood oil to dress their salads.

Three cooking cups fine hominy, 1 cup boiling water, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 cups milk, 4 table-spoons butter, 1 table-spoon sugar, 1 egg.

Add salt to boiling water and slowly add hominy, stirring constantly. Boil over the fire for two minutes. Then put over hot water and cook until water is absorbed. Stir in one cup of milk and cook over hot water for one hour. Remove from heat, add butter, sugar, remaining milk and egg slightly beaten. Beat well and turn into a well-buttered baking dish. Bake one hour in a slow oven. Serve with a milk gravy made in the pan the ham was broiled in. Young children must not be given this gravy.

**Italians Told to Beware**  
ROME (AP)—A stern warning against attempting to enter the United States by illegal means has been issued to prospective Italian emigrants by Senator Luigi Lulager. He has pointed out the severe steps taken against clandestine immigrants by the American authorities, and has urged prospective emigrants either to await their turn in the quota or, better still, to go to France or Argentina.
