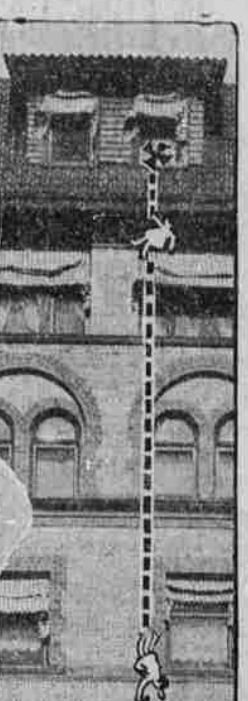
Alleged Thieves Returned

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MORE DEAD TODAY IN MIDDLEWEST

Storm Near Minneapolis Fatal to Five; Many Are Injured

TWO DIE OF HEAT NEAR PITTSBURG

Several Prostrations Also Reported; U. S. Weather Bureau Sees No Immediate Relief.

CHICAGO (By the Associated Press)—Fourteen persons were reported dead up to noon today in wind and electrical storms, some approaching tempests in the havoc wrought, in the middle western and western states.

The casualties included: Minneapolis district 5; Iowa, 4 (three at Adair and one at Smithland); Nebraska 4, three at Madison and one at Orchard; and one at Doxman, Mont.

PROPERTY DAMAGE HIGH. MINNEAPOLIS (By the Associated Press)—Wind, nearing tornado proportions, accompanied by heavy rain, tore and twisted its way through Hennepin county leaving besides five known dead and 29 injured, property damage running into millions.

MINNEAPOLIS (By the Associated Press)—The number of dead from last night's electrical storm in this section was brought to five today.

Three persons were killed and five injured at Carver when the county fair pavilion was demolished.

TWO DIE OF HEAT. PITTSBURG (By the Associated Press)—Two deaths and several prostrations attributed to heat were reported here today with no prospects of immediate relief, according to the weather bureau.

HOLD TO HEAD POLAR FLYERS

OSLO (By the Associated Press)—Lieutenant Lutnow Hold, selected today to head the Norwegian government flying expedition to search for the Amundsen party, told the newspaper "Dagbladet" his orders were to reconnoiter along the edge of the arctic ice fields without attempting to fly across the ice to the pole.

He said Amundsen has small hints for use as signals and he hoped to be able to locate the explorer by this means. He said his thought he would be able to see from air about 100 miles on clear days.

Italy Honors Garibaldi.

ROME, (AP)—Anniversary of the death of Giuseppe Garibaldi, Italian patriot, was observed throughout the nation Tuesday.

At Capri, where Garibaldi died in 1882, several thousand veterans wearing the red shirts of his troops, contrasting with the black shirts of the present-day Fascists who joined the Garibaldi veterans in memorial services at his tomb.
