A few days later, Gordon, Cuthbert, the catching sensation of the season, the greatest young catcher to break in this big show since Ray Schalk, according to Combs Mack, suffered an injury somewhat similar to Gray's.

Among the pitching and catching sensations of the season in Gray and Cuthbert, is a terrific blow even to a club as good as Combs Mack's. The jinx is relentless.

Electric Wire Finds Ore Thirty Feet Down

STOCKHOLM, (AP)—My third unique electrical prospecting methods Swedish mining engineers have located for the government valuable ore fields in the hitherto very part of the country. The new method discovered Swedish experts, copper, lead, zinc and iron ore in small quantities.

These successful methods of location are based on the greater conductivity of beds of ore than of the surrounding rock. At one point a deposit of copper ore 25 feet down under a nearly plain nearly two miles from the nearest ore-bearing horizon, at which to place a number of instruments. A current of voltage was sent under a French wire, 25 feet of cable and ten feet of soil. The Lundberg-Nordstrom method utilizes electrically charged wires and in shallow trenches. Through a telephone the prospective miner "talks" with the presence of ore. The Swedish method is independent of geologic conditions with the earth, and depends entirely on electrical phenomena.

These new methods have now been combined and history the discovery of Swedish, mining engineers electrical prospecting to being carried out in different parts of the United States, Canada, South Africa, Spain, Finland, and Norway.

Spanish Veterans Get Loans

SALERN, (AP)—The state banks throughout Italy. U. S. Aid Administration has been authorized by the American government to loan money to Spanish veterans. Approval of these loans was made under a law enacted at the last session of the legislature extending benefits of the loan act to participants in the Spanish-American conflict.

The President and Mrs. Coe will be guests while here.

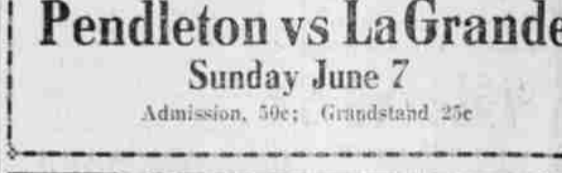
