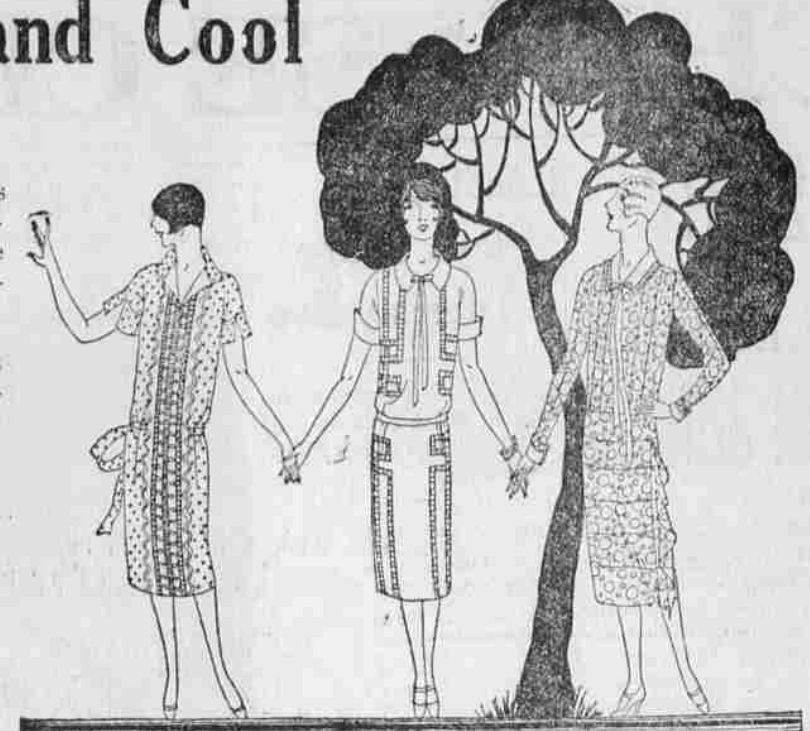

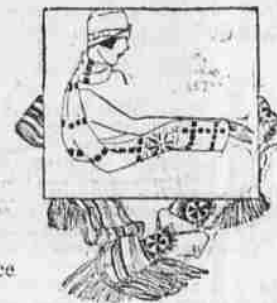

### Tommy Gibbons Plans An Aggressive Fight

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Tom Gibbons of St. Paul, master defensive boxer, says that he has planned an aggressive battle to defeat Gene Tunney in their 15-round fight tonight at the Polo Grounds.

"I'm going to be on the offensive from the first bell," he said. "I'll make a fight out of it and the faster Gene comes at me the better I'll like it."

Asked if he expected a knockout Gibbons evaded the question. "I've been misquoted," he continued. "I never said I'd knockout Tunney, but at the same time you can expect me to keep trying to land a finishing punch all the time."

Tunney, who arrived in New York Thursday from his Saratoga lake training camp, appeared in excellent condition. The retired lightweight champion, Benny Leonard, will be his second.

Confidence pervaded the ranks of the Tunney followers, although Gene himself, had no predictions to make.

Added importance was given the fight Thursday with the receipt of a cablegram from Jack Dempsey to Billy Gibbons, manager of Tunney, stating the champion "would positively meet" the winner of the fight. If the proper inducements are offered, Dempsey's message was sent from Berlin, where he is enjoying a honeymoon with his bride, the former Estelle Taylor.
