BOLO GROUNDS, New York (AP)—Gene Tunney, American light heavyweight champion, knocked out Tom Gibbons of St. Paul in the twelfth round of their 15-round bout here Friday night. Tunney kept up an aggressive attack on his opponent throughout the fight and after one minute of fighting in the final round landed a crushing right on the St. Paul man's jaw; Gibbons fell heavily in a neutral corner and was barely able to rise before the count of 10.

LOCOMOTIVES Bear Names Of Well Known Race Horses LONDON (AP)—The London and North Eastern Railway has revived a custom of the old stage coach days, when every coach had its name, and now gives every locomotive a title instead of a number.

The first of a series will be named for well known race horses some of the new locomotives being labeled "Flying Fox," "Orion," "Hermil," "Ladak," "Pessimism," "Robert le Diable," "Donovan," and other notable runners of the turf.

The Southern Railway also has adopted this idea, naming its engines for well known men. "His Majesty" is the largest locomotive on the line in one, and "The Prince of Wales" another.

Every locomotive in the passenger service throughout the country soon will have its name and in time none but the little freight yard switching engines will be known by numbers.

The Oregon manager completed the arranging of schedules for the Webfoot teams last weekend in the meeting of conference officials at Seattle.

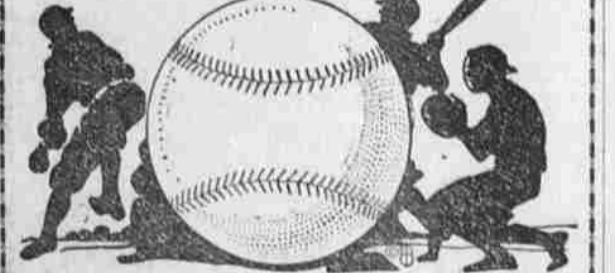
