Sister Mary's Kitchen BY SISTER MARY

Thin cream, spinach with poached egg on toast, milk, coffee. Luncheon—Asparagus with buttered crumb, cream sandwiches, black cherry pudding, milk, tea.

When a fruit salad is served in the dinner menu, a dessert is not necessary. The cheese and cream may be served with the salad or as a separate course.

Black Cherry Pudding. Two cups rich milk or 1 cup milk and 1 cup cream, 5 tablespoons butter, 1 scant cup sugar, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 4 eggs, 1 cup sifted toast crumbs and the cherries with the pits removed. Mix lightly but thoroughly. Fold in the whites of the eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered baking dish. Put dish on several thicknesses of paper in a pan of hot water. The water should reach half-way up

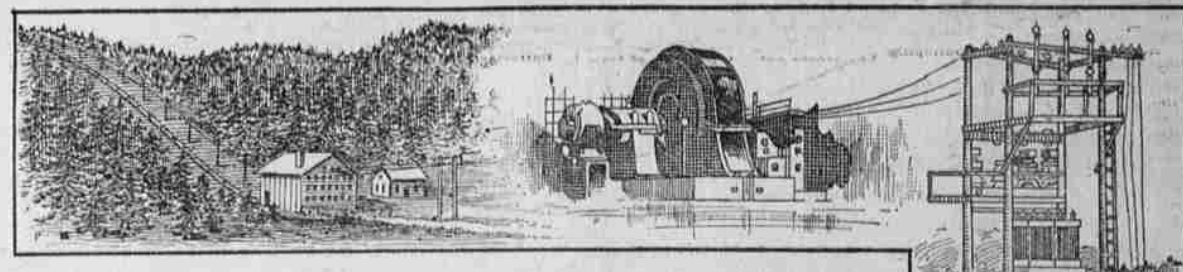
