(Continued from Page One.) On the part of the public of just what we are doing, said Mr. Powell, "Communism may be taught in the religious schools of Canada but not here. It is impossible to review here the courses given, though we wish to some way we might get it all before the public. But take for example the work given in one class of each of the intermediate years—the 12-year-olds we are giving training in the junior citizens; to the 13-year-olds, the citizens junior, and to the 14-year-olds, living at our best. That which would help the school most would be for the public to acquaint itself with the work being done. We invite inspection at all times."

One of the big tasks being accomplished in the assembling, the superintendent declares, of the personnel necessary to run the school and also keep the ranks filled as one after another drops out. It falls between 65 to 70 people giving volunteer service of from 15 minutes to 50 minutes a day. East Oregon Granges Show Constant Growth

DALLAS, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—Growth of the Oregon state grange was shown to be constant in the report of the secretary at yesterday's meeting of the state organization here. In eastern Oregon, the report shows, since 1922 the number of subordinate granges has increased from 23 to 51.

Another resolution introduced had for its purpose the protection of the powers of the state against private exploitation. This was left with the committee for a more definite statement, and will be introduced later.
