CRIMINAL ANARCHY ACT HELD VALID Conviction in New York Is Sustained by Decision; Holmes and Brandeis Dissent.

WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press)—As part of its campaign to rid its docket of worthless cases, the supreme court announced today it would scrutinize more carefully heretofore the qualifications and standings of those who apply for the privilege of practicing before it.

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HEAT WAVE BROKEN BY BRISK WIND

Temperatures Drop as Much as 45 Degrees in East Today

SUNDAY TOLL IN PHILADELPHIA 71 Rain and Windstorms Combat Warmth in Iowa; Colorado Suffers from Terrific Gale.

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—The backbone of the heat wave was broken today by practically all sections after claiming one hundred forty-nine lives yesterday—seventy-one in Philadelphia alone.

BROKEN IN WEST DES MOINES, Ia. (By the Associated Press)—A series of rain and windstorms starting in the western section of the state and moving eastward late Sunday broke the heat wave which has prevailed in Iowa for the past week.

GALE HIT COLORADO WRAY, Colo. (AP)—A gale of tornado-like proportions late Sunday swept through an area of about 25 miles in this section, demolishing more than a hundred buildings and injuring a score of persons, reports here indicated.

TRACK LAYERS KILLED PERU, Ind. (AP)—Eight negro track layers and one trainman were killed today when the west-bound Chesapeake and Ohio freight train overturned while rounding the curve near Converse, Ind., 15 miles south of here.

15 MEN ENTOMBED STURGIS, Ky. (AP)—Fifteen men were entombed by an explosion in Mine No. 9 of the West Kentucky Coal company today. Nearly 200 men were working but about 185 escaped through other exits, according to company officials.

SITUATION SERIOUS, LONDON (AP)—Official circles today regarded the Chinese situation as more serious because of reports that the strikes are spreading to more Chinese cities. No news has been received here concerning the fate of missionaries in interior China.

AGREEMENT REACHED, GENEVA (AP)—British Foreign Secretary Chamberlain and French Foreign Minister Briand announced today that complete agreement had been reached by Britain and France on all points of a reply to Germany's proposal for a western Europe security pact.

NEW CHEMERY PLANNED, EUGENE, Ore.—The Independence Creamery company with headquarters at Independence, Ore., and owning 55 plants has announced that it will start construction of a creamery building 60 by 150 feet, according to an announcement by B. F. Higgins, who will manage the company's affairs here. It is expected that the plant will be in operation by next fall.

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WORLD-WIDE FUSION IS HOPED FOR

President Coolidge Declares America Has Shown the Way

SPEAKS TODAY AT CENTENNIAL MEET Is Guest of Honor at the Norse-American Centennial at Minnesota State Fair Grounds.

MINNESOTA STATE FAIR GROUNDS, Minneapolis (By the Associated Press)—America's success in raising national unity from its melting pot of diverse racial elements points the way for fraternity and cooperation among peoples on a world-wide scale, President Coolidge declared today in an address at the Norse-American centennial.

Expresses Thanks. "We are thankful for all of them and yet more thankful that the experiment of their common citizenship has been so magnificently justified in its results," he said.

BRITISH STAND IS MADE CLEAR PARIS (By the Associated Press)—The Havas News Agency correspondent at Geneva says he is authorized to announce that in the note with British Foreign Secretary Chamberlain delivered today to Foreign Minister Briand Great Britain guarantees security of the Rhine frontier as laid down in the Versailles treaty and will consider as cause for war any violation of the territorial clauses regarding the Rhineland.

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
