Henry Muir, who has been visiting at Enterprise, is at home again.

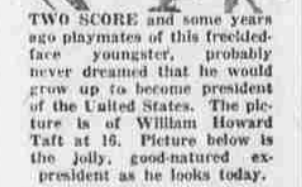
Mrs. Beatrice Coons, who has been teaching school at Price, Utah, has returned to her home here.

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## Sister Mary's Kitchen

Breakfast — Grapefruit juice, broiled bacon with liver, creamed potatoes, bran muffins, radishes, milk, coffee.

Luncheon — Cream of spinach soup, croquettes, rice soufflé, milk, tea.

Dinner — Tomato bouillon, broiled salmon steaks, egg sauce, hash in orange sauce, carrot salad, shredded fresh pineapple, oatmeal, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Children under school age will not eat the liver suggested for breakfast. The fruit juice, potatoes, bacon and muffins with milk make a good breakfast for four-year-olds who have a busy morning out in the sand pile before them.

One cup butter, 1-2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 2-2 cups flour, 2 cups rolled oats, 1 cup seeded raisins, 1/2 cup nut meats, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, few grains salt.

Cream butter and slowly beat in sugar. Add eggs well beaten. Put cream butter and slowly beat in of the flour chopper or grind in a coffee grinder. Combine flour,
