ROME, (AP)—Much discussion has been revived concerning the making of the Tiber river navigable from the Mediterranean as far as Rome, at least for freight barges and small tugs. Proponents of the plan argue that the growing population of the capital is beginning to tax the railroads beyond their capacity to bring food and other supplies. If grain and heavy materials could be brought from the sea by water it relieves the railroads of a tremendous burden, and might even make prices slightly cheaper.

Each guest was given a paper which identified every other member of the party. The girls' ages, stations in life, education and other conditions were given in detail. The identification of the men included the amount of monthly income they could produce to support a family. The fee for admittance to the party was 50 yen, although no arrangement was made to refund it in case the mating plans went awry.

Radio Reduces Expense Of Russian Relief Work

ERIVAN, Russian Armenia (AP)—The radio is about to invade southern Russia. 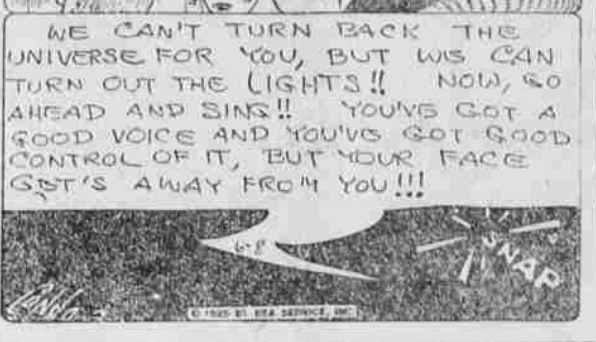

Richard Dix Is "Shock Puncher" in Paramount Film.

Well, we had the right dope on Richard Dix in "Too Many Kisses," didn't we? You have but to read the reviews from all over the country to learn that it's just about the most popular picture of 1925. Dix takes another leap upward in his sky-rocket to fame. Folks like this big, husky, handsome, regular guy.

Dix has a worthy successor in "The Shock Puncher" by the same author. In this one, Richard tackles your run-of-the-mill and does some high class knock-down-and-drag-out fighting with Walter Long on the one lone girder that formed the twenty-sixth floor of the new American Tel. and Tel. Building downtown New York, that will have you spinning and clinging to the chair, gasping, one eye-watering gut so tight with fright, he had to be lowered tenderly to the ground, in the arms of one of the twenty professional sky-climbers who act in the picture.

Frances Howard is the girl in "The Shock Puncher," but you won't know this Frances. You know Frances always played flapper roles on the stage till she hit "The Swan." She's been taken off her track and she's showing you her new flirty brown bobbed hair. She's a very nice chick of dimpled dynamite in this film.

"So This Is London" Is Classified as Extremely Funny.

George M. Cohan never produced anything funnier than "So This Is London," the comedy with an international appeal, which Henry Furey will offer to amusement lovers at this city at the Arcade theater Wednesday evening at 8:15.

The plot has been cleverly conceived and is carried out in most logical fashion. It is based upon the misunderstandings on the part of Brits and Americans, and the Yankee's misconception of the Englishman's point of view when he visits London. It has proved just amusing to the son of John Bull as to Uncle Sam's nephews right here at home.

The situations have a distinctly Cohanesque flavor. They are represented as exceedingly droll, the dialogue humorous and witty, and throughout the three acts there is said to be a vein of delicate satire that tickles the ribs in a delightful way.

The characters are defined by the characteristics of Sir Percy Beauchamp, a member of the British peerage, and Hiram Draper, an American captain of industry, form the basis for much of the laughter with which the play abounds.

"So This Is London" comes here after a run in New York and Chicago with a cast headed by Lawrence D'Orsay, the original star, and production on a par with that seen there and with that originally presented at Broadway.

Moscow Sinks Foreigners To Rebuild Its Dwellings

MOSCOW (AP)—American contractors are invited by the Bolshevik government to rebuild ruined or dilapidated buildings in Moscow. In return for this work the government offers the American possession of the restored buildings for rental purposes for a period ranging from ten to 40 years. At the end of that term the buildings automatically become the property of the government.

As the Soviet government has no immediate means of its own to build new dwelling houses, office buildings or other structures, it has adopted the expedient of having foreigners or Russians who possess the necessary means take over ruined or partially damaged buildings for reconstruction purposes. These are renovated entirely at the expense of the contractor, his only compensation being the privilege of renting.

Old Watch Revives Tales Of Nevada's Frontier Days

TIENO, Nev. (AP)—Hornes Greeley's memorable ride in a stage coach driven by Hank Monk when the "father of journalism" visited this section of Nevada in the early sixties, was recalled recently in a local jewelry store for repair. The old timepiece, presented to the hotel Nevada stage coach driver in 1863, has works of English manufacture and the case of 18 karat gold and weighing 1-2 ounces, was made by R. K. Shreve in San Francisco.

The watch bore this inscription: "Presented to Hank Monk as a testimonial of the appreciation of his friends for his skill and carefulness as a whip."
