The class was presented by S. D. Stevens. E. L. Schell awarded the diplomas. Lola Robinson was class valedictorian.

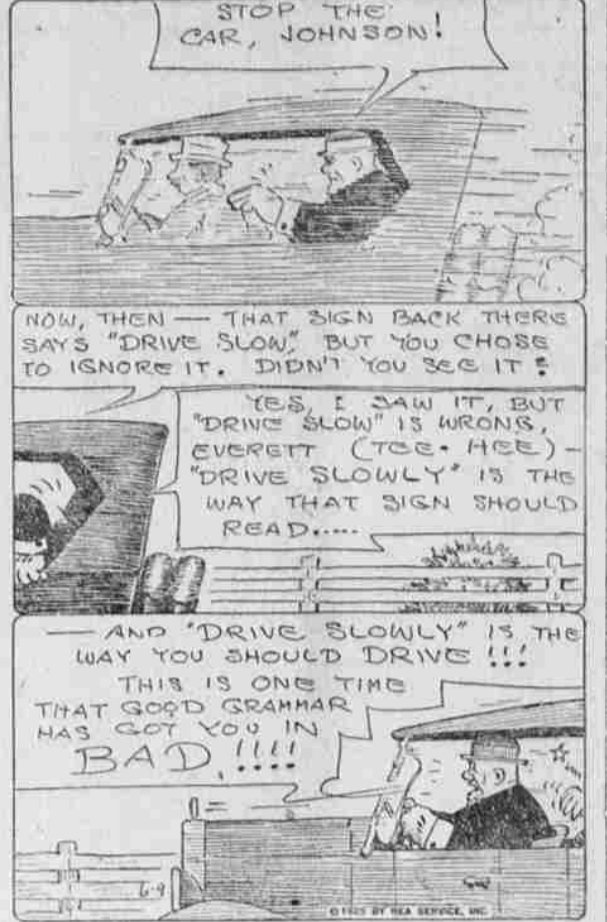
The profession of flowers, obtained from Sweet Home and vicinity, was unusual.

Nothing funnier has ever been offered to the amusement loving public than George M. Cohan's, "So This is London," which Henry Dury brings to the Arcade Theatre Wednesday evening at 8:15. Seats are now selling at Glass Fruit Store.

Based upon the misunderstandings on the part of the British regarding Americans and the Yankee misconception of the Englishman's viewpoint, it is original in theme and treatment and altogether one of the most enjoyable plays ever written. It has been just as big a hit in Great Britain and Canada as in the United States and there is nothing whatever in it to offend the sensitivities of the citizens of any country.

Cohan always reveals in funny situations and in "So This is London" the complications are of the most side-splitting sort. The dialogue is said to be witty and humorous with a delicate vein of satire permeating the whole. The offering is a study in contrasts, that afforded by the conception of the British nobility as expressed by Sir Percy Beauchamp and the American millionaire as represented by Hiram Draper, being particularly interesting and extraordinarily comical.

The cast is headed by Lawrence D'Gray, who will be seen in the important role of Sir Percy Beauchamp, the characterization he created in the character of Pawtucket, the star of "The Earl of Pawtucket." The balance of the company and production is of a par with that seen in the major cities of the country.
