HELP SURPLUS IS REPORTED

SPOKANE, Wash. (Special)—All workers and owners coming her from west of the Cascades, equipped with the usual influx of itinerant laborers from Montana and the prairie states have created a considerable surplus of help at employment offices of the Inland Empire, according to the U. S. weekly employment service letter issued here today. Several leading companies in the pine districts have gone to the extent of posting notices that no men are needed.

Both woods and sawmill operations throughout the pine region are fully as active as they were last season, the letter states, but the closing down of the camps on the West Coast, together with curtailment of the sawmill here, is responsible for the unusual number of men coming here in search of employment. Concluded reports from the various centers are as follows:

Idaho—Plenty of all kinds of labor. Turnover fairly heavy. Many workers from outside points coming here.

Montana—Surplus of help here. Little work of any kind done here this year.

Washington—Few jobs were offered here last week. Skilled pine timber workers still employed but large surplus of common labor.

Colorado—Labor supply slightly larger than demand. Five sawmills and one box factory operating with local help.

Yakima—Fair amount of work. Plenty of help at present.

Honolulu—Large surplus of all kinds of help.

San Diego—More than enough help to meet any local demand. Lots of itinerant labor migrating in and out of here.

Postal Revenues On Decline, Summary Shows

WASHINGTON (AP)—Postal revenues instead of being boosted as contemplated in the increased postage rates, which became effective April 15, are declining at the rate of more than \$12,000,000 a year, it was indicated Monday in a summary of receipts for May.

Receipts at 50 selected postoffices for May totaled \$27,454,861, an increase of \$29,035,231 for April and \$29,035,959 for March. These figures which turn in more than half of the country's total postal receipts reports a decrease of more than \$26,000 for each business day as compared with March when the old rates were in effect.

Newark, N. J., reported the largest increase in receipts for May, as compared with May a year ago, 19.65 per cent. Four offices—Pittsburg, Mo.; Moline, Mo.; and Syracuse—showed decreases.

Asiatic Expedition Renews Search for Cradle of Man

PEKING (AP)—In further pursuit of its quest for traces of primitive man in the stratum of the ice age, the third Asiatic expedition of the New York Museum of Natural History, in cooperation with the American Asiatic Association has started on the first leg of its renewed penetration of the wilds of Mongolia and Chinese Turkestan. Its first permanent camp will be 1,000 miles northwest of Kalgan, on the site of last year's discovery of dinosaur eggs, which aroused much keen interest throughout the world. Here the leader of the expedition, Roy Chapman Andrews and his corps of scientists expect to undertake the imposing transport train of the Asiatic dis-patched some two months ago.

The work of exploration will start at the first camp where an effort will be made to rediscover a nest of dinosaur eggs found on the last expedition, but just again because of a terrific sand storm that changed the topography of the country. It is planned to drop off the first group of men there, where rich finds are anticipated also in fossil remains of prehistoric animals, while the main expedition continues west along the north slope of the Altai mountains and then north in the direction of Chinese Turkestan. The objective this year is to work in a more recent stratum of rocks, which might result in fossilized traces of human evolution.

"On the geological side," Mr. Andrews explained, "we hope to find into the same of true wild horses and what came of them. We hope to secure fossils of both for the museum. We have with us a paleontologist whose work will be to study fossilized plant life and to judge what the climate was like in the various periods. This will enable us to decide whether it was a suitable place for man, and that of our chances of finding traces of prehistoric man."

Besides the usual equipment of the expedition's equipment includes seven motor vehicles, cars and trucks equipped with special tires for negotiating desert sands. The personnel totals 48 men, and supplies there is being transported in 2,500 gallons of gasoline and two million of oil for the cars, plus a ton of flour, a ton of sugar, a ton of sugar and other things in proportion. The only food supply that can be counted upon in the country to be explored is meat. The expedition expects to reach Kalgan on its return about the middle of September.

Wall Street District Is Not Unmindful of Its Lowly Servitors

NEW YORK (AP)—Wall street with its skyscrapers loomed on the horizon of the city last night, and is held by a turbulent garrison of 15,000 by night.

Wall Street is the sole livelihood of this skeleton force of nightfolk. In discharge of a sense of obligation, it has quietly rendered an interesting piece of citizenship work for the last few years. This major result of the work, leaders say, has been to convert the district from New York's most polychrome hot spot, with 100 families representing 22 nationalities, into probably its most closely knit, most homogeneous community.

The work is financed by non-corporate firms and individuals under the name of the Lowering Green Neighborhood association. The activity is expressed, for example, in terms of a model four-story dwelling house on Wall street for headquarters, a lounge and playground covering nine city lots on the riverfront, 25 flourishing orchestras and clubs for young people, and social and political clubs and lodges for adults, educational classes, health clubs and community services in general either singly or in conjunction with out-of-town agencies.

Trash collectors later joined by Astorians, Syrians and Greeks headed the column in downtown Manhattan, which also includes, along Third, Broadway, Soho, Hudson, and Broadway, and other fashionable sections, two alleys to cover bring together all racial diversifications, mostly considered, the sleep-swing, association found asleep.
