ers need work up any enthusiasm over news that France and Italy have taken certain very short little steps toward "settling" of the 6 billion and some odd—a mere matter of a couple of hundred millions hardly counts in such transactions—dollars of war debts they owe the United States.

The very most France and Italy will or can do will be to say, "Yes, we owe this money," and give bonds for it.

The politicians themselves will report to the country that they've accomplished something wonderful—as it is really still to be got France and Italy to go even that far—and ask to be re-elected on the strength of it.

All the bankers will have the bonds to unload on the public at about 25 millions profit for themselves.

But it isn't likely this generation of Americans, and perhaps not the next one, will see much of the actual money—even the interest.

"Not worth what it would cost to keep them alive." This verdict by W. B. Mayo, Henry Ford's chief engineer, sums up the entire reason why the government has so much trouble in finding private owners who will agree to look its war-built merchant ships in operation.

"Nobody wants them even as a gift." And, as Mayo adds, they're "poor material" for the very junk man.

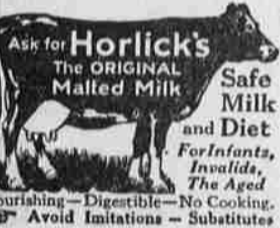

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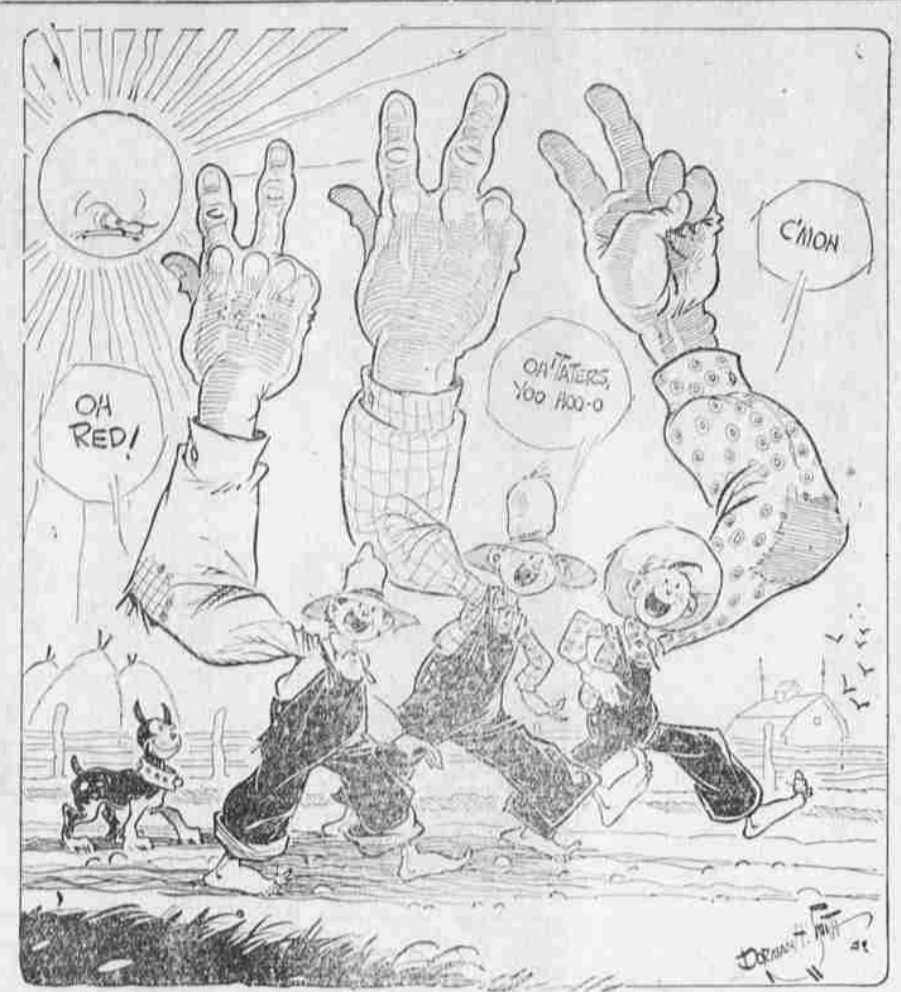

**Bored With Cooking, Women Of England Serve Badly**

**LONDON, (AP)—**Announcement was made recently that the London County Council had arranged to start three special centers where girls would be taught to cook. This news was made known simultaneously with the denunciation of middle-class cookery by Sir Alfred Kripp, surgeon-in-ordinary to the king, who accused the type of many women by his assertion that most of it was nothing short of "abominable."

Sir Alfred said publicly: "If there is one thing which makes for the commonness, dullness and even boringness of an ordinary middle class table more than the abominable cooking of the English woman, I would be glad to know what it is."

But there were some women here who agreed with the celebrated surgeon. Lady Nott-Bowman said: "A very large proportion of English women are rightfully bored with cooking, while French, Italian and German women are always interested in it. The consequence is that in this country, cooking is looked upon as a rather irksome duty, while in France and Italy it is regarded as a fine art."

C. Herman Stein, of the Food Association, asserts that one of the failings of the middle-class housewife of England is that they are in the habit of buying the best and most expensive cuts of meats, as is also the custom in the United States, while in France, Germany and Italy the women know how to make the best expensive pieces fit to nourishing and tempting dishes.

**THIN APPLES IN UMATILLA**

**PENNINGTON, Ore. (Special)—**Apple trees must be thinned vigorously this year in order to produce fruit of a quality to bring growers a profit, according to a statement made here by County Agent Bonham.

The advice to thin thoroughly was given by R. L. Long, horticultural specialist of Oregon Agricultural college, when he was here recently. He had just returned from Ohio and reported that the big apple growing states in the east will have heavy crops. Western growers to find a place on the market will have to produce quality apples, he said.

Prospectors are now that apple orchards near Starfield, Hermiston and Milton-Freewater will produce big crops this year. The trees are a little below normal in vigor, due largely to some winter injury and in some cases to a lack of sufficient water last summer, and because of this condition of the trees as well as because a big crop will be produced all over the country, thinning will be doubly desirable, the county agent said.

Shippers have advised growers that they can not expect to make any profit this year on five five apples or fruit of U grade. Mr. Bonham stated, "To avoid this the successful, experienced apple growers are now busily engaged in thinning. The loss incurred by the number of homewives who already have applied for our young women graduates."

There is very little variety in what is served in the English middle-class homes, and the average home-wife has no idea what is meant by vitamins and other food values. Much of the housekeeping money is spent in buying what is believed to be good food, but what is in reality of little value from point of building up home and income.

Menu also monotonous, and the housewife clings with almost pathetic faith to the English tradition of roast beef and leg of mutton. It is all nonsense to say that a man should have a pound of grilled steak."

Lemons designed to remedy the monotonous meals in the average home will be one of the aims of the new special municipal courses in domestic science, says Lady Trautman, who says that if necessary she will fall up her sleeves, don an apron and teach a class herself.

**Shrimps May Establish Denver Headquarters**  
**DENVER, (AP)—**Denver, within the next two months will become the headquarters of the nobles of the Mystic Shrine, the Times announced Tuesday afternoon. The establishment of national headquarters is the direct result of action taken by the imperial council meeting in Los Angeles last week, the paper says.

The Shrine has existed until now as an association organized primarily for fraternal purposes. Its immense program, undertaken to aid suffering children and others not cared for by other agencies, has given it new purposes and greatly broadened its original object, says the Times.

Hence the imperial council has decided that it must logically incorporate, setting forth its new purposes and definitely defining its objects. Incorporation papers are expected to be filed next week.
