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FAIR WHEAT HARVEST IN STATE SEEN

and the condition of 100 per cent of normal indicates a production of 5,270,000 bushels.

The United States crop is estimated at 4,520,000 acres with a probable production of 29,637,000 bushels as compared with 25,000,000 bushels last year and 2,320,000 bushels two years ago.

Oregonians may average appears to be some less than last year, due principally to winter-killing alfalfa, and loss of clover from last summer's drought. Due to thin stands of clover and alfalfa in some localities the yield per acre will be below normal.

Some of the commercial hay sections figure that the commercial crop this year will not be more than 60 per cent of normal. In the southern part of the state much of the alfalfa was cut during the latter part of May, and was considerably damaged by the rains occurring at that time.

Where wheat hay is largely used the field will be below normal, since most of the crop will be from spring seedings, due to winter-killing of the fall seedings, and the yield per acre of spring seedings is normally considerably below that from fall seedings. Wild hay gives promise of a normal crop, or better, due to the abundance of spring rain.

The United States hay crop prospect is for about the same acreage as the average for the past three years, but the production prospect is for only about 85 per cent of the crop of last year.

APPLES. The condition of the apple crop of the United States is estimated at 62.4 per cent of normal for the total crop and 66.4 per cent for the commercial crop.

Last year's condition would seem to indicate a considerably smaller crop at harvest than was gathered last year.

PEARS. The United States pear crop is estimated at 62.3 per cent of normal, with a forecasted production of 17,477,000 bushels. Last year's crop was estimated at 17,961,000 bushels after harvest.

"Intention to Plant" reports received to date indicate that there will be considerable increase in Oregon corn acreage over that of 1924, but that the acreage planted
