**AMERICAN GOLD RESUMING PREWAR FLOW TO RUSSIA**

MOSCOW, (AP)—Although no official relations exist between the United States and Soviet Russia, intimate contact by letter is maintained by Russians living in America with their relatives in Russia. Tens of thousands of Russians in the homeland are supported entirely by remittances received from sons, daughters, fathers or brothers who emigrated to America.

Previous to the world war, an average of \$50,000,000 was sent annually to Russia from the United States by Russians settled in America. Although this sum has never been reached since, the remittances gradually are assuming their pre-war level. Last month, for example, a single institution here which makes a specialty of banking business with Americans, handled nearly \$1,000,000 in remittances from Russians in America to relatives in Russia.

For a long time Russians here, especially in the villages, had no confidence in the local Russian currency, and insisted on receiving American greenbacks from their relatives. In preference to Russian rubles. But with the stabilization of Russian money this situation changed, and during the last six months more than 20 percent of the remittances transferred thru this one bank were in Russian currency.

German Court Says Judges May Go To Sleep When Bored

LEIPZIG, (AP)—A judge who was found napping has given rise to a far-reaching controversy in Germany. In the course of events this question was referred to the German Supreme Court at Leipzig, which came to the strange decision that his honor may safely take his little snooze now and then for in passing judgment it is his body, not his mind, which is the principal factor concerned.

As was to be expected, this decision has again evoked heated discussion among the best known jurists in the country. Prof. J. Goldschmidt, the legal authority at the Berlin University, expresses his opinion thus:

"One cannot expect a judge to give his undivided attention to the proceedings. He is obliged to attend to documents, to receive messages and to answer numerous questions during the trial. But if it is positively proved that he has been asleep, the case becomes prohibitive, for sleep signifies loss of consciousness, and also irresponsibility."

### Adventurous Mexicans Find Little Sympathy at Home

MEXICO CITY, (AP)—Because they did not first secure permission from congress to fight under the flag of another nation, Generals Calixto Ramirez Garrido and Juan Merigo will lose their Mexican citizenship if they succeed in their purpose of joining the Spanish forces in Morocco.

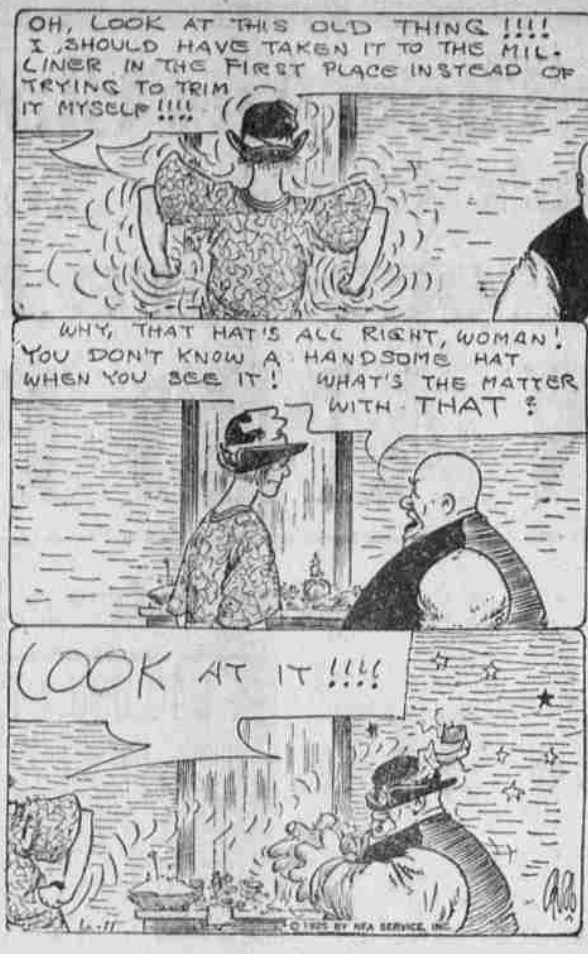
Their cases were brought before the Permanent Congressional Commission when the foreign office forwarded a petition from Sotero Sanchez Mejia, a Mexican resident of El Paso, Texas, for permission to fight the Moors. Ramirez Garrido and Merigo left Mexico some months ago for Spain, and the commission is awaiting proof that they have enlisted under the Spanish flag to take action under Article 27, Fraction II, of the constitution, and declare them expatriated.

Nazimova in Great Picture—"My Son"—at Arcade.

Edwin Carson's picturization of "My Son" which opens at the Arcade theater, is a mighty achievement for the First National director.

Nazimova plays the starring role and gives to the portrayal a finished quality comparable to the finest screen work. She plays the role of "Anna Silva," a Portuguese fisher woman who loves three men, her son, she loves most of all, for he is the image of his father. The drama that comes into the lives of Tony and his mother, brought by Betty Smith, a flippant rascal from the city, is vivid and compelling. The audiences at the local showing were held spellbound by the acting. Especially by the last reel were they affected. In that fast-moving bit of action they saw a mother turn tigress and fell him with an axe handle rather than see her son become a thief.

Jack Pickford plays the name role and proves to W. Griffith's statement about him: "Jack Pickford is the most natural actor that ever walked in my studio," the "old master" said.

Other splendid portrayals are given by Hobart Bosworth, Charles Murray, Mary Akin, Ian Keith, Constance Bennett and Dot Farley.

Carson personally directed the picture and Fritz Fox wrote the scenario. The settings are picturesque and very different from the usual run of cinema sets. John J. Schuler is credited with the art direction and deserves great praise for his skillful and artistic work.

Carson produced and directed "The Bad Man," one of the greatest artistic pictures of last year. He also made "Madonna of the Streets," but we feel that in "My

Son" he tops them both and places himself among the foremost of our American screen directors.

With fine deft touches he paints a fast-moving picture of a simple drama that abounds with human heart interest and compelling love. One can scarcely believe that the picture is eight reels long, it grasps one so.

Here's a mystery story with a new angle: a picture of San Francisco's underworld with a novel twist that makes it highly entertaining and thoroughly enjoyable.

Whether in a seventeenth century costume or in his favorite cowboy garb, Tom Mix is always original in his exploits. Aided by Tony, his wonder horse, Mix outwits his foes and escapes by a clever ruse in his latest William Fox starring vehicle, based on Zane Grey's "Riders of the Purple Sage."

Mix enjoyed performing the thrilling feats of Dick Turpin in merrie England, but there were many incidents in the course of producing "Riders of the Purple Sage" to indicate he was happy to be back in a western setting. He is always planning deeds of new daring.

One of his most thrilling feats in "Riders of the Purple Sage" is his escape when ambushed by hired assassins of his arch enemy, an unscrupulous cattleman.
