RUSSIA FIGHTS BOOTLEGGERS

MOSCOW (AP)—Bootlegging in Russia is an evil as great as it is in the United States. The illicit manufacture of vodka, which is 30 per cent pure alcohol, is universal throughout the country. The prisons are crowded with men and women convicted of bootlegging. Every day the government confiscates hundreds of home-brewing stills, calling the owners to Siberia or sentencing them from one to three years of hard labor.

Wine of good quality can be had all over Russia. The government has found it expedient to permit the manufacture and consumption of wine for purposes of revenue and to save the extensive Russian vineyards in the Caucasus, the Crimea and Armenia from economic ruin. The manufacture and sale of beer also is allowed. Breweries formerly owned by individuals have passed into the hands of the government which operates the breweries through state trusts.

Although punishment for violation of the vodka prohibition act in Russia is almost as severe as the penalty prescribed by the American government for violation of the Volstead dry law, vodka is found at every well-ordered inn in Russian homes. In many

cases it is home-made from common potatoes, rye, raisins, sugar or even ordinary honey, while in other instances it is of the pure bootleg variety derived from grain alcohol. It is drunk not so much as a stimulant or thirst-quencher, as an ingredient to the appetizer.

Wine of good quality can be had all over Russia. The government has found it expedient to permit the manufacture and consumption of wine for purposes of revenue and to save the extensive Russian vineyards in the Caucasus, the Crimea and Armenia from economic ruin.
