In addition to the passing of Root, some of the other tried and true veterans just couldn't hit their stride. Incidentally, the pitching staff experienced much trouble.

The sensational Cubs of 1908, the Athletics of 1910, the Chicago White Sox of 1919 and a half dozen other winning combinations have all passed up. The experience the Yankees are now going through is

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Athletic Stars in Semi-Finals Today

CHICAGO (AP)—Intercollegiate track and field stars from 62 universities and colleges will match their speed and heft in the preliminary of the national collegiate championship meet on Stages field today to reduce the field for the final Saturday afternoon.

The meet, recognized as the outstanding event in intercollegiate athletics, will determine the individual national champion of each event.

With the exception of southern California, which won the eastern intercollegiate meet, winners of other sectional championships will participate. These include Michigan, victor in the western conference championship, Leland Stanford, winner of the Pacific coast conference title; Missouri, winner of the Missouri valley conference; Pennsylvania, winner of the middle Atlantic conference; Washington, champion in the northwest games; and Texas, south-western conference titleholder. Four California institutions will be represented.

UNIVERSITY HEAD HOLDS TENNESSEE LAW UNSAFE

CHICAGO (AP)—Dr. Walter Dill Scott, president of Northwestern university, in a statement Wednesday commenting on the Tennessee anti-evolution instruction law, said any such law was dangerous.

"Any law against the teaching of evolution is dangerous," Dr. Scott said. "In that it is an attempt to halt the search for reality and true religion can have its roots only in reality. The church has nothing to fear from science."

German Crops Promise Well.

BERLIN (AP)—Germany is expecting a record harvest this year, according to expert forecasts. Official reports in Prussia, as well as throughout Germany, assert that the prospects are as favorable as they were in 1912. For many decades, experts say, the crop outlook has not been better than it is in 1925.

(AP)—Prohibition in the United States has proved to be the handmaiden of thrift, home building, happiness and prosperity, and it would go a long way in England toward solving the problem of unemployment, said Gerald France, the president, addressing the National and Commercial Temperance Union here at its annual conference.

Mr. France said he rejoiced in the sinking of the vessels "Flying the Jolly Roger of the bootlegging fraternity," and he hoped those men who financed this traffic would lose every penny they possessed, rather than that "the fair name of Britain should be dragged into the mud of international treachery."
