Year of 13 Months Advanced by League To Benefit Business

LONDON (AP)—The railways of Great Britain have classified approval of a questionnaire issued by the league of nations, through the International Union of Railways, for the adoption of a year of thirteen 24-day months, it was announced here recently. The alteration would involve a fixed Easter, and an extra "year day" would make up the total of 365 days of the calendar. A "leap day" is also provided.

Two projects for the alteration of the calendar have been launched, according to tongue of national officials here. In broad outline one provides for a year of thirteen 28-day months, and the other for a year of four quarters, each quarter to contain two months of 30 days and one month of 31 days. It would be some years before the scheme could materialize, it was explained, as several

nations have yet to be convinced, and even should an agreement be reached the plan agreed upon would have to be ratified by the various governments.

Mills Report Increase In 1925 Lumber Orders

As compared with last year, orders received by the larger saw-mills of the country gained one hundred thirty-two million feet during the first twenty-two weeks of 1925, or 29 percent, while production decreased nearly seven million feet. For the week ended May 29, 392 mills shipped 5 percent more than they cut, and had orders for 94 percent of their production.

Southern pine shipments for the week declined about seven million feet, largely because of mill stock conditions, and orders fell off five million feet, probably for the same reason as certain items are becoming harder to buy, while production made a gain of about a million and a half feet, the mills operating fully in order to keep inventories rounded out. The price situation in southern pine is still very spotted, but firmness is becoming more general.

Largely because numbers of mills that have been on a five-day schedule have returned to a six-day, orders for the week ended May 29 were 1 percent below the output. Shipments, however, totaled 14 percent more than was cut. It is believed the spirit in production is in preparation for the summer shutdown. Orders from the middle West are in greater volume, and so large amounts have been booked for shipment to the Atlantic coast that vessel rates are advancing.

Both California and inland Empire pine manufacturers report large increases in bookings during the week.

Mexico Working to Reorganize Its Army

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Troop movements into the capital which late in May, increased the garrison to the unprecedented figure of 15,000 and caused excited speculation elicited the reassuring statement from the war department that the men were being brought to Mexico City from outside posts to be reformed and re-trained.

Reorganization of the army in accordance with plans announced by the Calles administration when it took office has been proceeding steadily for nearly six months and the regular forces, according to latest information available, have been reduced to approximately 50,000. Among the enlisted men discharged were 2,000 numbers. The number of generals and commissioned officers down to the rank of major, who have been unable to prove their right to the rank they claim and have been dropped, total more than 1,000.

Modernization of military regulations, unchanged for more than a century, and a plan for a modified system of universal, obligatory military training are the tasks assigned to a special commission of officers.

Allen Peal, proprietor of the La Grande hotel, has secured the two buildings just back of and adjoining the hotel and has thereby added a number of choice rooms for the accommodation of his guests.

Louis Deparis has been compelled to raise the price of his meals to 25 cents. Everything has so raised it was impossible for him to serve a first class meal for 15 cents, as was the case several months ago.

At the Warburton hotel in Baker, June 7, took place the wedding of Mrs. W. Hoffman, of Union, and Miss Grace Wright of Medical Springs. Judge W. W. Travillion performing the ceremony. Both are prominent young Union county people, the groom being the son of W. H. Hoffman, a pioneer of the county and the bride the daughter of Hon. and Mrs. Huntington Wright of Medical Springs.

At M. Stackland of the Cove, was in the city Friday stating that there would only be about one half of the strawberry crop this year, also that the cherry crop would be short. However, there will be large quantities for exportation and fears are expressed among the growers that they may find it difficult to secure pickers. Stackland brothers will receive a car of berry boxes this week.

Bob Friell, near Summerville, has the material on the ground for a new barn. W. J. Caviness, who has 150 of head, has 40 chickens and 22 white turkeys. Mr. Caviness says had the growers been led to believe that could secure white labor it could have been obtained and will be in the future.

After passing through the principal streets they halted at the grandstand where Turner Oliver delivered the address of welcome on behalf of the city.
