**New Crop Pest Found.**  
FOREST GROVE, Ore., June 15. A new crop pest has invaded Washington county and perhaps other parts of Oregon, according to reports of T. McWhorter, county agent. The pest has been identified by authorities at the Oregon Agricultural college as the corn seed maggot, familiar in the east but heretofore unknown in Oregon. Specimens obtained by the county agent from the farm of H. E. Rowland, near Cornelius, were submitted to the college. Reports from there say that there is no record of the pest in Oregon and a study of its habits and probable methods of eradication are being made at once.

"I have pitched my last game in the majors if things break as I hope they will," remarked Johnson to me after the all-important thriller that decided the championship.

"I have several reasons for so thinking. First, I hope to buy a minor league franchise that should prove more profitable than a mere big league salary.

"Second, I am not sure that I still retain enough stuff to be a consistent winner. I want to quit the American league before the batters force me to such a decision.

"I got the breaks in the series after I had apparently "blowed." It would be impossible for me to be in a better position to capitalize

on my work."

Johnson failed to secure the minor league franchise that he had in mind. Much persuasion was brought to bear upon him to return to the Washington club. A fancy salary was the most alluring inducement.

**BIG WINNER**

When a club wins a world championship, its greatest hope is that it will continue to be a strong contender the following season. That makes it possible to cash in on the title.

Prior to the start of the present season some of the experts expressed a doubt as to Washington's chances to be strongly in the running. Already such fears have been put to rest, the Nationals must be strongly reckoned with.

No less a distinguished personage than Connie Mack says that Washington is the club that must be beaten for the pennant. He hopes it a smart club, with a great defense and a pitching staff that knows what it is all about.

In the 1925 showing of the champions no one player has done more to keep the club in the race than Walter Johnson. He has been the team's most consistent winner. Incidentally his hitting

has been a potent factor in a number of his victories.

As a matter of fact, Johnson's batting has been even more remarkable than his pitching. In every one of his first six games he has made one or more hits.

It was indeed fortunate for Washington that Walter Johnson failed to land the desired minor league franchise. He has been the team's big threat in more ways than one.
