SNAKES FOR PLAYTHINGS

BERKELEY, Cal. (Special).—There's one little girl in the world, whose picnic excursions will never be spoiled by the uninvited guest—a snake.

She's Virginia Lee Schubach, aged 2.

Virginia has a dozen kinds of snakes for pets and playthings. Like all little girls, she likes dolls, but she adores the slithery, graceful and beautifully marked reptiles that glide noiselessly about her daddy's farm, the queerest farm in America, a snake farm.

"Pop" Schubach buys and sells snakes for all purposes. Hunters comb mountains and deserts for new specimens. Half a hundred varieties of snakes, ranging from tiny fellows that slunged in the palm of his hand to huge reptiles, in demand by sideshows and circuses, stock his queer farm. Venoms is extracted from the big rattlers and shipped to drug concerns.

Schubach is an expert with snakes. They all look alike to him, but he has a wonderful respect for the Gila monster, a native of Arizona deserts.

"The Gila monster is more deadly than all the rattlers in the world," says "Pop." "Most snakes are harmless and non-poisonous, and with the exception of the rattler which is the fighter, will run away if given half a chance."

But little Virginia with a huge bull snake coiled in her arms gives another tact to the age-old enmity between man and reptile.

PASTURES TO BE STUDIED BY EXPERIMENT STATION

An extensive study of the pastures of Oregon, which will cover a period of several years, is being conducted by the Oregon Agricultural college station. N. C. Jamison, dairy extension specialist, has been temporarily transferred to the experiment station to take charge of the work. The work is to be started in Washington county. An effort is being made to get farmers to keep an actual record of what the cows are producing on pastures.

"The development of more pastures for dairy cows in Oregon is an important problem, both from the standpoint of economy of production and nutrition," says F. M. Brandt, professor of dairy husbandry.
