ago and 95 a year ago. Even sections where the drought has been most severe, sheep have suffered less than cattle. The spring has been favorable to lambing and a good crop, with losses reported as generally light, except in portions of the southwest where losses were heavy due to the poor condition of the ewes. Shearing is nearing completion in most states and a good clean clip obtained. Some shortage of FLEETINGS IN WOLLEN storage of wool not previously contracted is reported.

Condition of Ranges.

The condition of ranges for June 1, counting 100 as normal, follows: Oregon 102; Idaho 104; Washington 92; Utah 87; California 99; Montana 103. The condition of cattle: Oregon 95; Idaho 98; Washington 86; Montana 101; California 97; Utah 87. Condition of sheep: Oregon 96; Washington 88; Idaho 103; Montana 106; Utah 97; California 98.
