United States Lead All Other Countries in Electric Mileage
 SAN FRANCISCO (AP).—Railroad electrification in America comprises between 20 and 25 per cent of the world's total railroad electrification, states the report of the electrification of steam railroads committee presented to the National Electric Light association convention here.
 The total mileage of electrified railroads in all other countries of the world is 4,504 miles. Sweden leads with 744, France second with 659, Switzerland third with 526 miles. Germany's mileage is only one mile less than that of Switzerland. Then in succession come Italy with 564 miles, Austria with 543 miles, South Africa with 151 miles, Chile with 148 miles, Norway with 125 miles, Spain with 69 miles, Japan with 48 miles, Canada with 28 miles, Java with 31 miles, Mexico with 20 miles, England with 28 miles and New Zealand with 8 miles.
 In the United States there is a little more than 900 miles of electrified railroad, exclusive of terminals.
 In its conclusions the committee report says:
 "This country has been built up on rail transportation. We must sustain it and we have now come to the point where, if industry is to continue its magnificent growth, transportation's capacity must always be its equal; there must be no charge laid to transportation that it has been a cause of its inhibition. Each and every individual in this country depends upon the success of transportation. The United States and every individual section of it must be accorded its natural growth; that it may sustain it, we must face the fact that traffic is going to double, and double again.
 "For the growth in traffic which no one who believes in the future of America will question, it is

NEW DIRECTOR FOR WALLOWA

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special).—At the Wallowa school district election, June 15, E. C. Waugh was elected to serve the three-year term on the school board for that district.
 The secretary's report showed that 475 pupils were in school last October, 225 of which were boys and 250 were girls. Of the 551 enrolled in the elementary classes, 172 were boys and 179 were girls. There were 10 teachers in the elementary grades and 14 in the high school. Of the 22 teachers, three were men. The number of class rooms is 14 and the term is nine months long. The school library now has 400 volumes, 50 of which were added this year.
 Maintenance.
 The cost of maintaining the schools for the past nine months was \$22,583.59, of which \$27,121.59 was for salaries, and \$2,612.50 was for interest on the \$45,000 of outstanding bonds. A sinking fund of \$1500 yearly is maintained, there now being \$2000 for that purpose.

ROAD CONTRACT IS LET

GOLD BEACH, Ore.—Another stretch of the forest service road at the Rogue river from Gold Beach, a distance of 13 miles, which will carry it to Lobster creek, was awarded to Alving L. Miller of Gold Beach at his bid of \$7250. A. H. Wright of Grants Pass, supervisor of the Siskiyou forest service, made the award.
 There were several bidders, among them Aes and Jess Turner, who came within \$50 of tying Mr. Miller's bid. A bidder is to be built across Lobster creek by the forest service, starting about July 1, and will be under the direction of C. N. Skar. The county of Curry has appropriated \$5000 toward the construction work of road and bridge.

Sherrys Showing "Isn't Life Wonderful" Tonight.
 "Goose Hangs High" Is Epic Film of Family Life.

D. W. Griffith has an interesting story to tell of the attitude in his studio when he selected the story for his latest production, "Isn't Life Wonderful," which has become one of the most famous of all films, and which will be the feature at the Sherry Theatre.
 "It is our custom," he said, "to discuss the stories proposed for a film with the staff, the players and other advisers.
 "Some of the stories we have only a few people liked before the filming. Of these was 'The Birth of a Nation.' Many of my closest advisers most earnestly warned me against the story.
 "Then everyone who had stories that anyone seemed to like—though when everyone likes a story I immediately get suspicious.
 "The 'Isn't Life Wonderful' is the one story that no one ever liked. I told it to the cameramen and they stood silent, one mentioning a headache. I told it to the players, and they spoke of vacations, and the hope that when I started the story following this one, they would feel ready. The young man who attends to publicity raised an objection. He said, 'I had a headache.' The business office merely registered a grin and a similar veto.
 "However, it had the 'feel' to me of a picture story. I could see it, somehow, no matter what the objections. If I don't feel a story, I never try to make it. And after all, I wasn't wrong this time.
 "The trouble is, though, how am I to judge a story in the future?
 "Also a comedy showing 'Flyer Tracks.'
 It jazz is doing it certainly is giving a wicked last note.

AG-MEN MEET IN CORVALLIS

O. A. C. Corvallis, Ore. (Special).—The eighth annual meeting of the Northwest Association of Horticulturists, Entomologists, and Plant Pathologists will be held in conjunction with the American Phytopathological society, Pacific division, here June 22 to 24.
 Prominent speakers, considered authorities in their fields, are coming from British Columbia, Idaho, Washington, California, Utah, Arizona, Montana, and the United States department of agriculture. The fact that these two organizations with kindred interests are holding their meetings at the same time and place is expected to bring together the largest number of plant pathologists, horticulturists and entomologists ever seen on the O. A. C. campus.
 Emery pollination will be discussed by C. E. Schuster, associate professor of pomology at the college, in the horticultural section of the meeting Monday. Gordon G. Brown of the Hood River branch experiment station, will outline the "Production, Harvesting and Storage of D'Arbois Peas in the Hood River Valley."
 In the entomological section, E. J. Newcomer of the United States bureau of Entomology, will speak on "The Effect of Adding Casein Sprays to Insecticides." "Experiments in Fungicide Potatoes and Tomatoes with Hydrocyanic Acid Gas," will be the subject of an illustrated lecture by R. E. Dana of Washington State college.
 In the general session Tuesday morning, among the subjects on the program are "Another Apple-Tree Anthracnose in the Northwest, and a Comparison with the Well-Known Apple-Tree Anthracnose," "A Method for the Prevention of Core Break-Down in Apples," and others.
 Special sectional discussions will be held and joint meetings of the two organizations have been arranged. Trips to points of interest in the Willamette valley will be taken Thursday.

Gold Seekers Invade Wilderness of Canada

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP).—Lured by the stories of a rich strike of gold last summer by two trappers, Hugh Ford and Bill Gray, who deserted their trap lines long enough to unearth a rich pocket, fortune-seekers are rushing into the lease Lake country of the Cascades.
 Since the report of the strike reached the outside world hundreds of prospectors have gone north to try their luck in the wilderness. All except the hardiest spirits remained at Wenatchee or Telegraph Creek, because of the ice on the Stikine river, but with the ice gone the rush is on. Both Telegraph Creek and Wrangell, which depend mainly on the outfitting of big game parties and the fur trade for their livelihood, have been crowded all winter. Already the first boatload, commanded by Sid Barrington, veteran Klondike boatman, has started for the lake where the gold was discovered.
 The Canby gold field is not a new one. Although abandoned for many years, it was one of the first to bring fame to British Columbia as a mining country, and the trails that it being followed

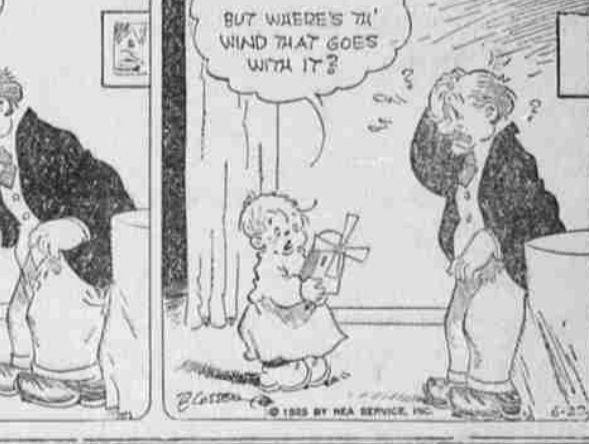
