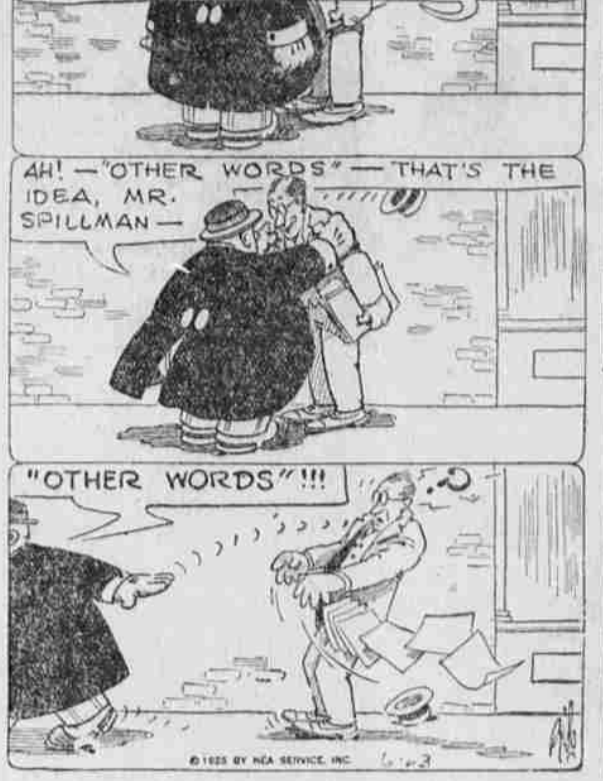

Krolger, who will do the brick work on the sugar factory and also is burning brick, will require over 500,000 at the factory, consequently there will be considerable stir at the brick yard for several weeks this summer to see nothing of the brick that will be used in other buildings which are in construction and contemplation.
