California Club Uses U. S. Mails Extensively

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Approximately 3,000,000 pieces will constitute the outgoing mail of the Automobile Club of Southern California this year, it was indicated in statistics released recently by the headquarters of the organization. The figures were based on the amount of mail matter sent during 1924.

First-class letter postage of the motoring organization averages 2,000 letters a day. In addition 2,000 pieces of second-class mail matter and some 100 parcel post packages are sent, totaling for the daily outgoing mails an average of 3,000 pieces. The figures, although 300 working days in the year, revealed that the club sends out annually 1,000,000 pieces of mail.
