Sister Mary Says:
Breakfast — Stewed rhubarb, codfish patties, bread-muffins, milk, coffee.
Luncheon — Vegetable soup, croquettes, lettuce salad with lemon juice and oil, graham bread, gingerbread sandwiches, milk, tea.
Dinner — Hot veal loaf, creamed potatoes, asparagus salad, strawberries, sponge cake, Parker house rolls, milk, coffee.

The vegetable soup is made with a meat stock and finely minced vegetables are served in the soup, making a more "filling" dish than a strained soup.
Children four years of age should not be allowed to eat the rolls suggested in the dinner menu. Bread or toast should be provided for them.
Gingerbread sandwiches are delicious with lead tea or lemonade and are rather "different".
Gingerbread Sandwiches.
Gingerbread, 1 cup finely chopped nut meats, 1 cup sifted and sifted, 2 tablespoons cream, 1 teaspoon salt.
Cut cold gingerbread into slices not more than 1 inch thick. Work cheese with cream until moist. Add salt and dates and nuts and work with a fork until smooth, adding more cream if necessary. Spread half the slices of gingerbread with cheese mixture, cover with remaining gingerbread and cut into small squares or triangles.

AMERICA IN BUILDING BOOM NOW

It was that "The pessimist of today has small room, indeed, for comfort."

America Takes Lead.
"Europe and the Orient no longer furnish the world its ideas on building construction, city planning and community development," said the speaker. "America, which until recently was a follower, has become a leader which now dominates, both in methods of financing and methods of executing huge development projects."
"We are not only developing our own types of buildings and improvements, we are leading and teaching the rest of the world in the arts and sciences of building, in community planning and civic development. The enterprise and vision of America's real estate man, her architects and her builders has brought about this transfer of leadership."
"We have entered a sweeping cycle of rebuilding. Every city in the nation today is confronted by the fact that it must practically rebuild itself. They already are doing it as rapidly as the tools and implements of the builder permit."

Of the \$125,000,000,000 of wealth in the United States, \$155,000,000,000 or nearly one-half is represented in land and its built-up improvements, according to Mr. Straus, and although there may be no apparent housing shortage, the demand of Americans for modern homes, as well as business buildings portends the early reconstruction of every building erected within the last 15 to 25 years.

"There may be enough roofs today to cover every citizen of our nation, and floor area in which to transact all the business of the country," he said, "but building on a large scale will go on just the same."
"In every American city there are thousands upon thousands of apartments, individual homes and tenements which are obsolete. They were erected only 15, 20, 25 years ago. Today they are marked for demolition by the incoming forces of progress."
"Living Standard Cause."
The basis for this progress "is the ever-advancing standard of living in the United States," the banker said. "A majority of the people are living in far better homes today than they were a score of years ago, and the next twenty

years will witness a still greater improvement.
No fair prediction could be made concerning the up-in-the-air development of the cities of the future, Mr. Straus continued.
"Fifty years ago," the speaker said, "no one dreamed of a building reaching 20 stories into the sky. Another 50 years may bring about just as radical changes and the skyscraper of the closing decades of the twentieth century may attain heights and dimensions beyond the dream of any man living today."
"This may be brought about by the development of the airplane. Aerial navigation may produce as many changes in the lives of men and in the construction of our buildings and in the contour of city sky-lines as have the discovery of steam and the development of electricity."

Street Car "Shoots" Man
LOS ANGELES (AP)—A street car up and shot H. M. Whittemore in the left ear here Tuesday night. Receiving hospital surgeons who treated the slight flesh wound said it was the first shooting injury of its kind in the history of Los Angeles. Investigation revealed that a short's car pursuing bootleggers had accidentally spilled some revolver cartridges on the car tracks, and Whittemore happened along just as the wheels of a passing street car set them off.

Tokyo Suicides Increase 300 In Year, Police Report Shows
TOKYO (AP)—During the year ended with March, there were 1,262 suicides in Tokyo, according to records of the Metropolitan Police bureau. This was 300 more than the previous 12 months. Most of the suicides were because of jealousy or disappointment in love, it was stated.

The pistol was the least popular agency of self-destruction, two men and two women killing themselves by shooting. Poisoning was the means most frequently employed, 221 men and 271 women killing themselves in that manner.
