Plenty of Adventure And Drama in "Thundering Herd."

Here is a photoplay that tells a big story in a bold, startling way. "The Thundering Herd," at the Star Friday, is one of the few really great epic pictures of America in the making—a worthy successor to "The Covered Wagon" and "North of 36."

Produced on the same spectacular and gigantic scale, it deals with another tremendously important period of American history. It illustrates the courage and sacrifices of those men and women who, in 1876, left their farms in Illinois and Indiana to settle the far west, which today includes the states of Wyoming and Montana. The picture vividly recreates the west as it was then—a vast wilderness ravaged by great herds of buffalo and inhabited by fierce, nomadic Indians.

Much of the story was filmed on its actual locale, on locations personally selected by Zane Grey. Many of the scenes were taken in Yellowstone park. Many others were photographed in the rugged and majestic mountains of the north—twelve thousand feet above sea level and one hundred miles from

Blacks Discuss Lynching DENVER. (AP)—There has been an increase in the number of lynchings of negroes during the first half of 1925 as compared with the same period last year, James W. Johnson, New York secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, announced here Wednesday. Negroes from every section of the country were gathering here Wednesday for the annual meeting of the association which opened Wednesday night and will continue until June 30.

Ten negroes have been lynched during the past six months, Mr. Johnson said, while in the first six months of 1924 there were six lynchings. The lynchings for 1925 by states were: Mississippi three, Florida one, Arkansas one, Georgia one, Virginia one, Louisiana one, Kentucky one, Utah one.

Europe's Hidden Money Would Pay Debt Interest

hadn't been any gold in circulation from the time the war started, or a few weeks later.

Up to that moment there simply England's retail business was transferred in actual gold metal. There were no bills smaller than 5 pounds or a little under \$25.

For everything less than that the medium of exchange was notes, respectively about \$5 and \$2.50, with silver, of course, for small change.

With the war's outbreak all this gold vanished in almost less than a month. The government and the banks grabbed all they could get their hands on and stopped paying any more out, but laws and some of the staff remained unaccounted for.

People hid it. They couldn't ship it out of the country but they could and did hang onto it.

But when the gold standard was restored they had no reason for hoarding any longer. If they hid more they could get it, which they couldn't have done previously.

So, as suddenly as it had disappeared, back into circulation came gold again.

Now, the point the treasury department makes is that if this money had been out at 5 per cent interest it would have earned half as much as the total amount of it, during the 16 years it's been buried, to all intents and purposes.

Well, Britain has uncovered her hoard but France hasn't uncovered hers. It's estimated that she has two billions tucked away, counting gold and silver.

Five percent on that much for 16 years would have been a billion which is a quarter as much as the French debt to the United States.

Another thing. The treasury department points out that a gold dollar was good for a gold dollar's worth, when it's owner hid it in 1914; now it represents only 60 cents' worth.

While recognizing that economy's an excellent thing, the treasury department argues that the economist can overdo it, or, at any rate, that it can economize judiciously.

Bootleggers are Barred.
 CHICAGO (AP)—Propositions forever barring persons who transport, sell or manufacture liquor illegally were written into the constitution of the Modern Woodmen of America at the twentieth quadrennial "head camp" of the organization Wednesday. Another amendment automatically expels any member at present engaged in these pursuits.
