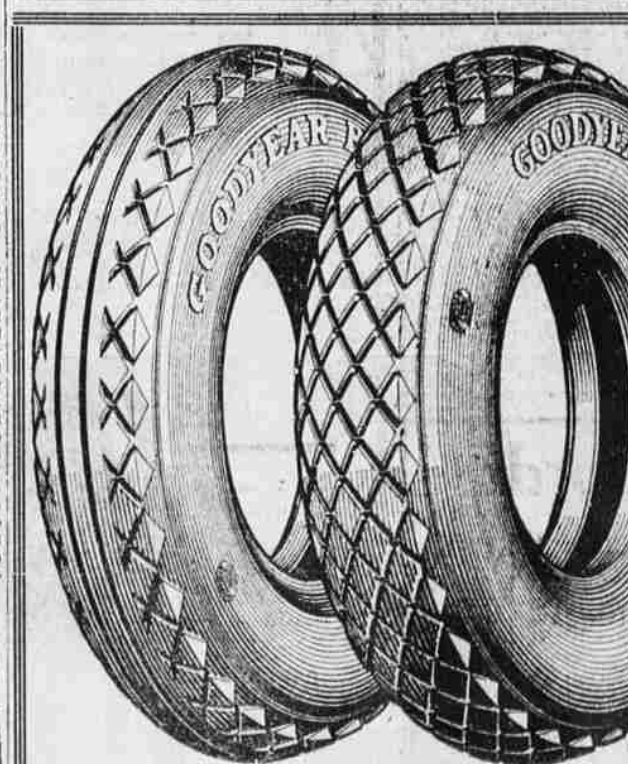

DROWNING BOY RESCUED

EUGENE, Ore.—The heroic rescue from drowning of Jerome Scott, a 2-year-old boy of Eugene by John Sanders, 19, also of this city, in the coast fork of the Willamette river was reported yesterday. The boy had been in a lead and ventured too far out where the current bore him downstream.

His cries for help were heard and Sanders, who was in a boat with a girl, jumped in with his clothes on and swimming 20 or 40 feet reached the boy who had lost consciousness. He took him to shore and resuscitated him in a few minutes. The rescue was witnessed by a large crowd of picnickers, including the boy's parents.

ROAD CELEBRATION SET HOOD RIVER, Ore.

(By the Associated Press)—A celebration to mark officially the opening of the Mount Hood loop and the completion of the Hood River-White Salmon interstate bridge will be held here July 4. A formal invitation to Portlanders to attend the ceremonial was extended by T. T. Baker, secretary of the Hood River chamber of commerce.

SALEM, Ore. (By the Associated Press)

A cool night with heavy dew falling and north wind blowing the fires back over burn-

ed territory, reduced the first fires in Siletz basin today. No new fires were reported today and the old blazes are burning slowly.

The opening of the loop road will be commemorated at Hood River meadows, 23 miles south of Hood River, where a delegation from this city will meet Portland automobiles at 10:30 a. m. and escort them south along the road. A number of features for the entertainment of visitors have been planned.

"The Mount Hood loop road will be, in the future, one of Oregon's greatest assets," said Mr. Baker. "We believe that the residents of this state should become acquainted with this road, that they may help to convey its message to those from outside states. We hope to have a large delegation from Portland for this celebration."
