**LOS ANGELES** (By the Associated Press)—The Southern Pacific is loading water trains at Carpinteria 14 miles south of Santa Barbara for use in the stricken town.

**SAN FRANCISCO** (By the Associated Press)—The Southern Pacific is sending a relief train to Santa Barbara, officials announced. The train is composed of nine coaches, several diners and carried a score of trained nurses.
