The commission reserves the right to reject any and all bids. By order of the commission June 17th, 1925.

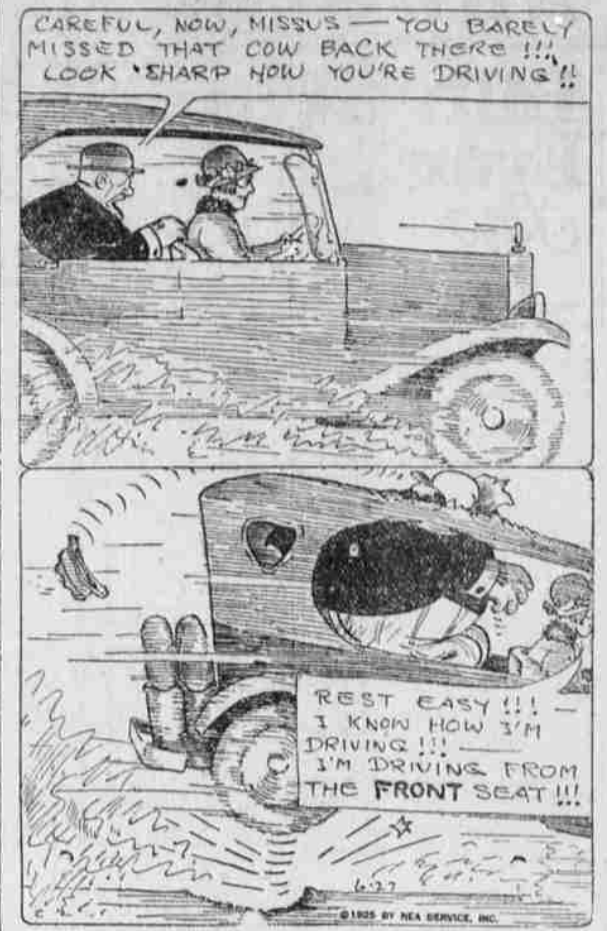

CATCH TROUT IN DITCHES

UNION (Special)—After the state commission had the two racks built at the fish hatchery to stop the upstream run of the salmon, the fish finally found an outlet into a large irrigation ditch and for several days there was excellent sport among the local fishermen, many of them catching the limit and some of the salmon weighing from fifteen to twenty pounds. The backlog was finally discovered and the screen repaired.

There are still a few salmon being caught above the racks in Catherine creek but they are very scarce.

Mr. Harriman, who had his meat market leased to Mr. Chaffler for the past year, has taken over the establishment and will conduct a market for himself. He has Alfa, a former employee of the same market, as meat cutter and will look the outside work himself.

The boys from Union who are attending the month of training at Camp Lewis are having a fine time, according to the reports being received by their folks here.

Following the tearing out of the salmon racks above and below the fish hatchery on Catherine creek Wednesday evening the banks of the stream were lined with fishermen the next day and dozens of large fish were landed during the first day of fishing. It is the opinion, however, of many old trout fishermen, that there will not be very good trout fishing in this stream for several weeks on account of the fish being so much frightened by the salmon catching.
