**NEW YORK (AP)**—Leaders in the major league pennant races Sunday night had beaten their way through the worst baseball squall of the 1925 season, slightly battered but still upright after a turbulent week.

The Giants' week was dangerously close to the shoals and Connie Mack's Philadelphia crew was threatened.

Unexpected breaks displayed the Giants from first place in the National league and then tossed them back again.

The Boston Braves jolted the champions for an 8 to 3 defeat Saturday afternoon, while the Pirates nosed out the Reds, 2 to 2.

Cincinnati then beat the Pirates, hoisting the New York club back into the lead. The upset left the Pittsburgh team within two percentage points of the leaders and set the stage for a crucial series between the rivals here starting July 7.

The Athletics, by virtue of four wins in six starts, lead by a margin of two and one-half games—a half game more than they had a week ago.

Both Chicago and Detroit closed in on the peak clubs, the former with six straight wins and the latter with four.

The Detroit Tigers displaced the St. Louis Browns in fourth place. The Tigers' victims were the Red Sox and the Browns.

Faber, Cygnars, Lyons and Robertson pitched championship ball for the White Sox, toppling Cleveland and New York, but the Yankees selected the popular Red Sox for week-end revenge, which carried them past the Indians into sixth place.

Cincinnati Reds, in spite of a slump during which they lost five games, were able to hold third place because Brooklyn made scarcely any better progress.

Philadelphia uncorked one of its periodic spurts and squeezed by Chicago into sixth place. St. Louis and Boston, in fifth and last position were satisfied with the peg on which they finished the week before.

**PITCHING CYCLES.**  
Pitching in the major leagues run by cycles on the 29th.

When I broke into the American league 20 years ago, pitchers using a fast high ball almost exclusively were the stars.

Cy Young, Babe Waddell, Walter Johnson, Fred Glade and other outstanding pitchers depended almost entirely on the effectiveness of the fast high one.

Recently there has been a run on low ball pitching, interspersed with much freak stuff, the knuckle ball predominating.

Bill Dinning, now an American league umpire, in his day one of the game's greatest pitchers, is looking for a revival of the high fast ball.

"I am sure any pitcher with a good fast one, pitched shoulder or better high, could win consistently in the majors. The novelty of the thing, if nothing else, would get him by," says Dinning.

Dinning says that more high flies result against high ball pitching; that it is far more difficult to properly time than low ball pitched between the knee and the waist line.

**SCARCITY OF CLASS.**  
For several years the class of baseball has suffered because of the lack of likely material culled from the minors.

Players capable of stepping into the shoes of fading stars like Cobb, Speaker, Collins, Johnson and the rest are few and far between.

As a matter of fact, those same players after having starred from 15 to 20 years, are still just about the best at their respective positions.

Looking over the ring material, it looks as if there was just as great a scarcity of good fighters as ball players.

Several of the present day champions are far removed from the standard of the fighters who for years have held championships.

It must be funny for Henry Leonard to size up the two boxers who have survived the lightweight elimination tourney in New York.

Jimmy Goodrich of Buffalo and Stanislaus Louza of Chile are shortly to swap punches to determine who shall officially be regarded as Leonard's successor.

The lack of real material in the lightweight division is typical of the condition in the feather and light heavyweight classes.

No doubt some of the champions of 20 years ago, as well as contenders for the titles, would like nothing better than a new lease on life. Pretty soft for them.
