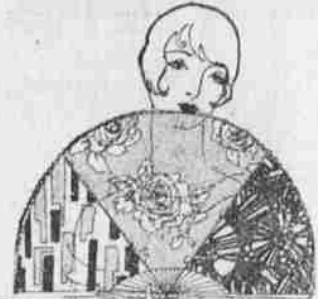

**Chinese Sentenced To Long Terms for Keeping Slave Pen**

**SHANGHAI (AP)**—Thirteen boys, some of whom have been imprisoned in a filthy, airless sweat shop for six years, were identified and claimed by parents in the French Mixed Court here recently. The lucky youngsters were a part of a group of 21 rescued by the French police.

The identification came as an interlude in the trial of Yu Pao-chou, proprietor of a workshop, accused, together with his wife, concubine, aman and three other accomplices, of maintaining a slave pen in which the children in question worked from early morning until midnight, unperfed, beaten and never allowed to see the light of day except when as filtered through a small barred window. Tables or benches for inefficient industry, attempted revolt or inability to labor on account of illness were told by the wails in a manner to bring tears to the eyes of listeners. were stolen from their parents and sold to Yu for \$5 each. Others were hired out as apprentices by parents little mindful of their fate. They were employed in making brass articles, glassware and matches which Yu disposed of on Seward Road. Three or four died as a result of harsh treatment, the court was told.

Yu was given a full term of 15 years to be followed by expulsion from the concession. His wife received a 10 year sentence, and Yu Ching-long, an accomplice who assisted in kidnaping, got a similar term. The concubine and amah, who appeared to have befriended the boys on all possible occasions, were released. The store and workshop were ordered sold to pay the cost of trial and to defray for maintenance of the unclaimed children.

## Old Indian Graveyard Found in California

**SANTA BARBARA, Cal. (AP)**—An ancient Indian graveyard, believed to antedate the California mission period, was discovered recently near Pajama Mission in the Santa Ynez Valley near here, by Don Meadows and Ray Gensell, Orange, Cal., research workers. A number of prehistoric specimens, including several Indian skeletons, skulls, beads and arrowheads were obtained. The burial plot, once the "happy hunting grounds" of the honored warrior of the west, was situated in the center of what was a large bean patch, which, up to the time of discovery, completely obliterated all traces of the important find. According to Meadows, they dug through three different layers of graves, each from three to four

feet in depth. It is possible that there are other graves below, he said.

The graves were buried in a sitting posture with the knees crooked beneath the chin. Of forty skeletons which were unearthed, every one was found facing westward toward the setting sun.

Above each grave, as a part of partition between it and the one above, was found a limestone slab several inches thick.

**WOES OF COACH.** "The most difficult task of a college baseball coach is to develop pitchers," says Joe Wood. Joe Wood is now head baseball coach at Yale. For years he starred as an American league pitcher. He ranks among the great right-handers of the game.

Certainly there was no glory for even the winning pitcher in such a game as that. No one hit the field during the progress of the man who had pitched Yale to victory. He was simply lucky.

In two different innings Yale made nine runs. Pitchers don't look very good when the opposition piles up that many scores in one inning.

Like the big business the college game, knowing the ball is lively and getting the inside stuff inside and taking a healthy cut at most every pitch.

That makes trouble for the pitcher.

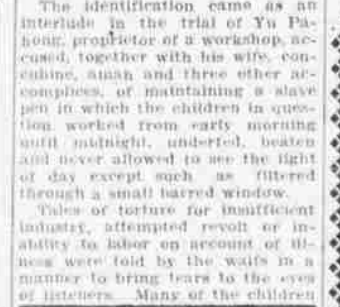
