## Fund Helps Workers During Slacker Season

**NEW YORK (AP)**—New York has a modified form of unemployment dole in the highly seasonal cloak and suit industry. Hundreds of workers, idle a requisite nine weeks this season, recently began receiving weekly benefits of \$10. The payments came from an unemployment insurance fund of more than \$1,200,000 originally conceived by a special commission appointed by Governor Smith, and now jointly borne by employers and employees themselves.

Workers pay in to the fund one percent of their wages each week they are employed. Manufacturers contribute two-thirds of the weekly payroll. If the manufacturer fails on the amount of their prepayment assessment to the

**Idaho Will Celebrate Reservoir Dedication**

**POCATELLO, Idaho (AP)**—A celebration at American Falls, Idaho, on July 13 will mark the dedication of one of the largest storage reservoirs in the world.

Constituting one of the most unusual arrangements in the history of irrigation, the reservoir will cause the submergence of an entire townsite, the buildings of which have been moved to a new location. A lake will be formed of water impounded from the Snake River.

The reservoir will contain a floor of more than 61,000 acres, bounded by a dam about 75 feet high and a mile long. The capacity under the original construction, now completed, will be 1,700,000 acre feet, or sufficient water to cover that many acres to the depth of one foot.

While most of this storage water is to be used for supplemental purposes on tracts under cultivation, the government has 120,000 acres, known as the Mindoka extension, that will be brought under the reservoir. So important is the undertaking regarded by the people of Idaho in point of stabilizing values and bringing water rights in the great Snake river valley to a parity, its building and publications had the development as overshadowing all previous constructive enterprises in the state.

An elaborate celebration has been planned. The committee in charge anticipates an attendance of 40,000.

**DOCTORS' PAY INCREASED.**  
 SALEM, Ore.—The state board control, at a special meeting here, increased the salaries of Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the Oregon state hospital, and Dr. W. B. McNary, superintendent of the Eastern Oregon state hospital, from \$2500 to \$4000 a year. The increased salaries became effective June 1, under the order of the board.

The motion to increase the salaries of the hospital superintendents was made by Thomas H. Kay, state treasurer, who said that Oregon paid the lowest compensation of any state in the union for this work. Governor Kizer and Secretary of State Koser joined with the state treasurer in authorizing the increases.
