Brooklyn Bridge Earns Good Profits For New York City

NEW YORK (AP)—Brooklyn Bridge is a shrewd landlord. Its eyes to advancing values of business property, as shown by the announcement that it will increase its rents some 25 percent as present leases expire. Commissioner Mills of the Department of Plant and Structures, as its fiscal agent, started the boom recently when he raised the first two tenants from \$3,000 to \$10,000 a year.

Brooklyn Bridge as a business building has been more or less a novelty for all its 46 years. This, the oldest of the four East River spans, has been more commonly regarded in the public mind as a great transporting institution, content to bear upon its patient back the daily thousands riding and a-foot, who come and go between Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Yet the same easeway of which the city is so proud, is also a roof to a considerable business institution. Chief Engineer Edward A. Byrne says it shelters 51 business houses within its lofty arches: 14 on the Manhattan side, and seven in Brooklyn. Six of the firms have been tenants for more than a quarter century. Collectively, they contribute to an annual rent roll amounting to \$72,419.22.

The "twenty-five year" club includes The New York World, The New York Evening Journal, each maintaining departments in the bridge structure and the "Brooklyn Bridge Cold Storage & Freezing Co., is one of the sizeable cold storage and packing adjuncts of Fulton Fish Market. Later tenants' number firms active in the adjoining leather wearing."

The bridge is a good moneymaker in other directions as well. Its surface cars, charging a nickel a roundtrip, and elevated cars charging a dime, together produce a gross income for the city of almost \$140,000. Seven stands where passing crowds regale themselves with fruit, candy and soft drinks pay about \$30,000 for concessions. Other sources of income bring the total yearly receipts from the bridge to \$297,552.44. This is deemed all velvet, because the bridge was built primarily as a transportation link.

Legislature to Get Report On Filipino School System

MANILA (AP)—The report of the commission, headed by Dr. Paul Monroe of Columbia university, which made a survey of the educational system of the Philippine Islands, is now in the hands of Eugene A. Gilmore, vice-governor and ex-officio secretary of public instruction, who will submit it to the legislature when it meets July 16.

Vice-governor Gilmore said the survey was not an investigation for the purpose of effecting a clean-up so that alleged undesirable elements might be weeded out, but that it was for the purpose of pointing out the defects which all human institutions have, in order that the proper remedies may be adopted for the improvement of the educational work in the islands.

"There has been an impression on the part of some that the members of the commission are after the scalp of somebody," said Vice-governor Gilmore. "This is erroneous. The commission was created that it might look over the whole educational system in the Philippines, make constructive criticisms, give suggestions, and submit recommendations in order that for every peso expended for education a corresponding benefit may be reaped by the people."

"In this work the government is spending an insignificant sum compared with the big appropriation set aside every year for education in the archipelago. In all we are spending \$12,000,000 annually. The appropriation for the survey is only \$50,000 and the expenses of the commission were within the appropriation."

"The whole scope of the educational system in the islands has been thoroughly gone over. A careful study of the questions affecting curricula, administration, finance and other phases of the question of instruction in the Philippines was made by experts in their respective lines in the United States. We hope to benefit by the task accomplished."

Movement Inaugurated to Have New Cruiser Named for Hawaii

HONOLULU (AP)—One of the new large cruisers to be built for the United States navy may bear the name of Hawaii. Governor Waltero R. Farrington announced that he had proposed to C. D. Lufkin, president of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Hawaii that that organization bring the suggestion before the secretary of the navy. Lufkin has taken up the proposal with the executive committee of the associated chambers, and, in a letter to the governor, expresses the hope for early action.

It was learned also that Representative Burton French, of Idaho, a member of the house committee on appropriations, who visited Hawaii recently, has written a personal letter to Secretary Wilbur, expressing himself in favor of the suggestion.

Proponent of Plan For European Fusion Presents Case Aw

VIENNA (AP)—A United States proponent of "pan-Europeanism," has become an unavoidable necessity, says a well known supporter of the idea, Herr H. H. Coudenhove-Kalergi, writing in a recent issue of the Neue Freie Presse. He declares further that those who, a few years ago, thought the plan utopian and believed Europe would find its feet without it, now admit that it is the only chance.

Among those strongly favoring the idea, Herr Coudenhove-Kalergi continues, are Poincare, Calliaux, Gasparri, Contarini, Herriot, Stresemann, Marx, Masaryk, Benes, Skrynski, Thugut and others. The failure of the Geneva guarantee protocol has brought the realization home to all that the nations are once more thrown back upon their armies and treaties for their safety. This condition is unacceptable, says the writer. At any moment the murder of an ambassador and an unfulfilled ultimatum may throw Europe and the world into a fresh conflagration.

On the other hand America's economic start of all Europe (which she owes to the exclusive possession of her own enormous market) is growing from month to month, while European production is everywhere lodged in by countless barriers. Anybody not blind to these two dangers must welcome the idea of an all-round European fusion. This applies particularly to the little states of Europe, who feel that in a new war they must inevitably be swamped and overwhelmed.

Austria is, of course, faced by the same danger. Herr Coudenhove-Kalergi goes on to say, it can hope for nothing from a policy aiming at an extension of power, but has much to hope for from a pan-American peace policy. Neither in an economic nor in a national sense is Austria an individual organism but rather a state torn from a large community and

condemned to maintain a separate existence. Viewed economically it is a member of the old Danubian empire, while in a national sense it is a member of the German people. In no wise is Austria a national state able to stand alone. Fusion or federation confront her, but either one of these steps would create international difficulties.

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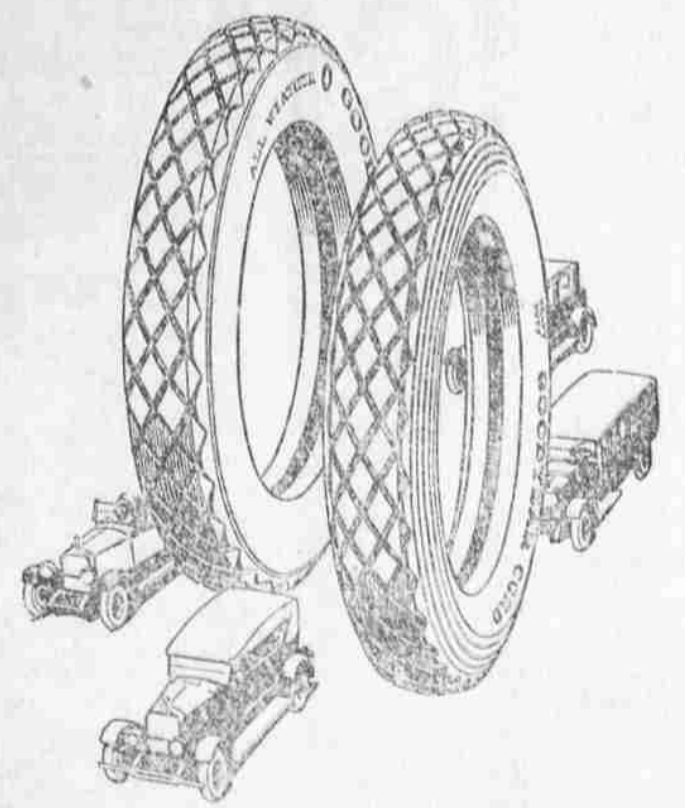
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
