PORTLAND, ORE. WILL BE HOST

WASHINGTON, (Special)—Methods by which the farmer and the business man of the Northwest can cooperate for their mutual advancement in the solution of common problems relating to agriculture will be discussed at a meeting of representatives of chambers and associations of commerce to be held at Portland, Oregon, July 17 and 18, under the auspices of the Agricultural Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The meeting will be the second of its kind to be held for the purpose of considering regional agricultural problems from the common viewpoint of business and the farm. The first, held at Kansas City last April, included eight states of the middle western and southwestern sections of the country. The Portland conference, called at the suggestion of W. D. B. Dobson, General Manager of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and E. E. Pavitt, Chairman of the Agricultural and Marketing Committee of the Portland Chamber, will be composed of representatives of commercial organizations of the states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, many of whom will be farmers.

Purpose of Meet
 The general purpose of the Portland conference is more specifically stated in a memorandum prepared by the Agricultural Bureau of the National Chamber. "National agricultural problems," it says,

"are made up of many local agricultural problems. The more completely the latter are attacked, the sooner will the former approach the point of solution. The task of clearing up these local problems rests not with any one group of interests but with all. For the interdependence of agriculture and other industries is a fundamental truth.

"More and more are agriculture and all other branches of industry realizing that they can work together for mutual benefit. The prerequisite of successful team-work of this character is a thorough understanding among these groups of one another's problems. That understanding best can be reached through informal, personal contacts.

"Commercial organizations have taken the initiative in developing such contacts and are meeting agriculture on a common ground. As represented by chambers and associations of commerce, this group is becoming more active in the task of hastening the day when this mutual understanding will be an accomplished fact. Such organizations are setting up agricultural committees and bureaus through which to coordinate their work.

"The Portland conference has been called to bring together from the states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington, representatives of commercial organizations who there will discuss their local problems and how these have been met; their mistakes and how possibly these might have been avoided. Through such a conference ideas are crystallized and they are developed into a constructive line of purpose. A similar conference held in Kansas City in April demonstrated how much of practical value a meeting of this sort can accomplish."

First Day
 The first day of the conference will be devoted to the discussion of practical methods by which chambers of commerce are approaching the agricultural problems of their trade areas—the organization and composition of agricultural bureaus or committees and their relationship to established public and private institutions, such as the state agricultural colleges and farmers' organizations. From the local viewpoint the conference will also approach larger questions such as agricultural credit, the marketing of farm products, agricultural legislation, farm cost accounting and boys' and girls' club work.

On the second day attention will be given to technical methods of outlining agricultural problems—regional surveys as a working basis for agricultural activities of chambers of commerce, and the translation of the results of the surveys into constructive action. Other subjects to be considered are crop and livestock improvement, the dangers in hastily conceived diversification campaigns, farm labor supply, farm-aid exhibits.

Jews Invest Heavily In Palestine Lands

JERUSALEM, (AP)—The Jewish national fund has invested almost \$4,000,000 in the purchase and improvement of land in Palestine from October, 1924, to April, 1925, approximately the period of Sir Herbert Samuel's administration as high commissioner, according to a report issued by the world headquarters of the fund here.

Of this money \$3,914,449 was spent in the purchase of agricultural and urban land and \$774,120 in land improvements, including the drying up of swamps, road building, water supply installation, and building loans to new settlers.

Twenty-nine of the 42 colonies established by the Palestine Foundation Fund in (Keren) Haagerd during this period, were built on land purchased by the Jewish national fund. This includes the seven colonies that are established by the Palestine Foundation Fund as part of its colonization program in building up the Valley of the Jezreel.

Both the Jewish National Fund and the Palestine Foundation Fund are agencies of the World Zionist organization, the former being a land-purchasing agency, and the latter engaged in the principal constructive enterprises, such as agriculture, education, public health and promotion of trade and industry, aimed at the rebuilding of the Jewish homeland. More than 60 per cent of the \$5 million spent by the Palestine Foundation Fund in the Holy Land was contributed by American Jews.

New Seiyukai Leader is For Closer U.S.-Japan Relations

TOKYO, (AP)—With the recent election of General Baron Tanaka as president of the Seiyukai, the second largest party in the Diet, political conditions in Japan are diagnosed by observers as "something." Gen. Tanaka, formerly minister of war, succeeded Baron Takahashi as head of the Seiyukai. Immediately after his election Gen. Tanaka brought about the merging of the Kakushin Club, with the Seiyukai. He then took a number of members from the Kakushin Club, another minor party, and brought the total membership of the Seiyukai in the Diet up to 140, an increase of membership of 162 for the Seiyukai, the government party headed by Premier Kato.

The vernacular newspapers report that Gen. Tanaka has approached the Seiyuhanto, the third largest party in the Diet, with a view of bringing its members back into the Seiyukai fold. The Seiyuhanto party is composed of members who broke away from the Seiyukai and prior to the accession of the Kato ministry. This latter move, however, apparently has met with some opposition, and it is believed by many that Premier Kato will be able to maintain his present coalition ministry at least until fall and perhaps for the next Diet. The cabinet now has Seiyukai members in it, but it is declared the leaders of this party are dissatisfied with the coalition and wish to place their own premier in power. For the present, though, the situation is very much unsettled.

Gen. Tanaka, in a recent newspaper interview, declared that "continuous efforts toward the development of close economic relations between Japan and the United States on one hand, and China on the other, will be the keynote of the diplomatic policy of the Seiyukai." He continued: "I believe that it depends upon the disposition of the various countries of the world in their vigorous and persistently against those injurious arrangements which tend to increase international complications and lead finally to clashes between nations and races. With this in mind, the Seiyukai will do its utmost to dispel the mistaken views held in regard to the present and future relations between Japan and America. In this effort we

hope to obtain the wholehearted sympathy and co-operation of the American statesmen and leaders.

"I am convinced that the efforts recently made by President Coolidge and many other distinguished Americans to correct the dissatisfaction felt in Japan over the passage of the Immigration law has already reacted favorably on this nation and has impressed our countrymen with confidence in the future relations between Japan and the United States."

Japan to Assign Trade Scries
 TOKYO, (AP)—The ministry of commerce and industry is understood to have decided to send abroad ten commercial correspondents for the purpose of reporting on trade conditions with a view to promoting Japan's foreign commerce. The correspondents will be sent to the following commercial centers: Vladivostok, Siberia; Tientsin, China; Hankow, China; Canton, China; Saigon, French China; Bombay, British India; Manila, Sulu; Australia; and Port Said, Egypt.
