SPRIT RIG ASSET. When a club keeps on winning despite many handicaps imposed by fate, it is a tribute to the spirit and general excellence of the team.

The Philadelphia club of the American League has already passed through such an experience during the past month.

Just at a time when the team was going along swimmingly, out in front by a comfortable margin, things began to happen.

The toughest break was the loss of pitcher Sam Green, who had won eight straight games. A "curse" seemed to be throwing his hand, the result of being hit by a pitched ball, robbed the club of its pitching ace.

Gray, after being out of the game for over a month, recently returned to the pitching mound against St. Louis. His performance was anything but satisfactory.

In six innings he allowed eight runs on 10 hits and gave six bases on balls. His wildness kept him in constant trouble.

Despite the loss of Gray, the outstanding pitching star of the American League the Athletics have continued to show the way as pace-setters.

INJURY TO GRAY. Instead of curling up after Gray had been put out of action, the club fought all the harder. Spirit flags up for the loss of the pitcher that had been supplied by Gray's over-pitching.

When Gray returned to the game after a month's absence, his club found a better percentage than when his injury compelled him to retire.

Pitchers told me that an injury to a thumb, on the pitching hand, is a far greater handicap than if it was a finger. It seems the thumb is far more important in getting a proper purchase on the ball than any of the four fingers.

It is very possible that Gray may be troubled by his injury for the rest of the season, even though it had recovered sufficiently to enable him to take his turn on the rubber.

In many ways the Athletics have already proved that Mack's 1925 combination is more than a mere flash. It looks as if Connie is usually to be rewarded artistically and financially, after many lean years that must have tested his patience to the limit.

The Athletics have a pointer at the bat that makes the team a dangerous factor regardless of the kind of pitching it is getting. In addition, it has the fighting spirit, an asset few Mackam clubs have possessed.
