Sermons by Wireless Exasperate Clergymen

ADDLESTONE, Surrey, Eng. (A.P.)—What he describes as "the lazy habit of wireless" has been stridently denounced by the Rev. A. Cum-ling, vicar of Addlestone, in his parish magazine. "There is no longer the packed church to which we have been accustomed during Lent," asserts the vicar, "and the reason for this is the wireless. "Anybody who thinks he can worship God by toiling back in an easy arm chair and listening by radio to the beautiful singing of the choir at St. So-and-So's, or the oratorical effects of the 'Bishop of Exarchata,' is simply living in a fool's paradise. True worship demands sacrifice. People who are too lazy to go upstairs and put their things on and come to the House of God on God's Day, are grossly neglecting their duty. "We must face the fact that in wireless has been found another powerful recruit added to the phalanx of counter attractions, which, in their various ways, continue to keep the people out of the church."

The British Broadcasting Company, which controls most of the wireless entertainment in the London area, has recently declined to broadcast Sunday sermons, excepting on rare occasions, because of the objections of ministers that their congregations would be materially reduced if the practice was followed generally.

One bunch asparagus, 4 eggs, 2

tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 3 cap dried full cream cheese, triangles of hot buttered toast.

Wash and scrape asparagus. Remove tough ends and cut tender portion into inch lengths. Cook in an little water as possible until tender. Cook eggs in water just below the boiling point for 20 minutes. Melt butter, stir in flour and

when smooth add milk, stirring constantly, until boiling. Add cheese, finely chopped and cook over hot water until cheese is melted. Arrange asparagus on hot toast and pour over the sauce, seasoned with salt and pepper. Cover with slices of the hard cooked eggs and serve very hot.

Breakfast—Berries, cereal, thin cream, creamed dried beef on toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Smothered asparagus, omelet, strawberry salad, hot rolls, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked ham, creamed potatoes, buttered spinach, celery and radishes, whole wheat bread, baked custard, raisin cake, milk, coffee.

A child under school age should not be allowed to eat the ham suggested for dinner but if it is served a "large" portion of the custard no other protein dish is necessary.

Extra toast should be made to serve to juniors in place of the hot rolls suggested in the luncheon menu.
