PORTLAND'S OFFICIAL VISIT.

The "official" vacation of Portland, as engineered by the Ad Club of that city, was a distinct success, according to several members of the caravan who expressed opinions about the Wallowa trip yesterday. There were a few details of the event that might have been worked out differently for the comfort and convenience of the visitors, but for the first time of its kind the caravan more than lived up to the expectations of those who made it possible.

The four or five Portlanders who had previously visited this section of Eastern Oregon and were so enthusiastic about the country east of the Blue Mountains, wished to impress on members of the caravan and Portland in general that the beautiful Wallowa vacation region is but 14 motor hours from the Rose City. This they accomplished and it was an end which justified the means. Without that object in view, it would have been much better for those in charge to plan an over-night stop in La Grande, rather than continuing on to the lake. Such a schedule would have made the trip just as satisfactory and much less strenuous. La Grande has adequate hotel facilities that would prove entirely satisfying, and the remaining drive to the Wonderland would be easy. Having demonstrated how short the entire trip really is, future excursions will probably be on a basis that includes La Grande as a night's stop.

Herbert Cuthbert, representing the Portland Chamber of Commerce, expressed the opinion yesterday that 80 per cent of the caravan members would return to the lake within the next year—and bring others with them. The entire personnel was most enthusiastic about the trip and about Wallowa. They did, indeed, "discover" Eastern Oregon and found that it is a land of beautiful valleys, fine farms, and excellent highways instead of a sagebrush country stretching from the Blue Mountains to the Nebraska line. La Grande enjoyed having them and will enjoy having them again, anytime and everytime. If we, as a city, left anything undone that might have contributed to their comfort and enjoyment, it was due only to a lack of knowledge as to what it was, not a lack of desire or interest.

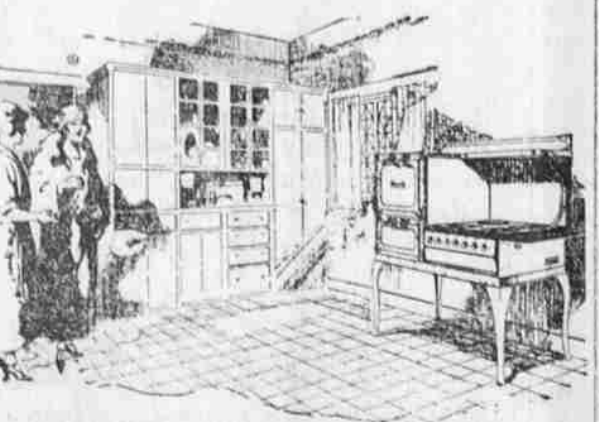

Finland Prepares to Sell Lumber in U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Finland, now the most heavily forested of European countries, has attracted much attention from American lumber manufacturers by creating an organization in its lumber trade for marketing in the United States. The National Lumber Manufacturers' Association, one of the American groups most concerned, has received advice that the Finnish saw mill owners have put in charge of their enterprise John Sankk, formerly a lumber manufacturer in Portland, Ore., and are attempting to establish a permanent foothold in this country.

American lumber traders have been somewhat jolted by the information, in view of the fact that in the past American lumber exports have gone to nearly all continents of the world. The only opportunity the Finnish producers

have to market in the United States, it was said, comes from the very complete utilization which they can make of their timber, and the willingness of their own consumers to use short lengths and bits of wood. The American experts point out that this national custom results in complete use of every tree cut, and lower operating charges against resulting lumber that may allow it to compete in the United States against home produced timber.
