#### DUCK HUNTING DATES SET

PENDLETON, Ore.—Information that efforts launched several months ago by sportsmen's organizations of Umatilla county to have the waterfowl shooting season opened 15 days later have been successful, has been received here by K. F. Ayvold from Ray C. Steele, United States game warden. An amendment to the regulations under the migratory bird treaty act has been signed by President Coolidge, according to the letter from the warden.



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## Revised Immigration Labor Provisions To Be Sought

WASHINGTON (AP)—Revision of the new immigration law to provide a selective system for bringing immigrants to this country will be sought at the next session of Congress by Secretary Davis of the Labor Department, who has jurisdiction over immigration questions.

Chief among the changes proposed will be one in connection with the contract labor provisions of the law, under which aliens are not permitted to come to this country at present if they have previous or contract for employment after reaching these shores. This provision, in the view of Secretary Davis, attaches a maximum risk to emigration from other countries, and discourages from coming here the class of immigrants most desirable to this country. He believes that the hard-working, substantial type of immigrant who has a family to support is almost barred under the present law because if his contract here is not do as bled, with no assurance that he may have employment after arriving.

If such aliens were given assurance of work before leaving their homelands, the secretary believes that under proper supervision, such a plan would induce a higher type of foreigner to take up citizenship here.

American labor, however, the secretary insists, must be given complete protection, work being offered to prospective immigrants only after it is found that there is no available American labor for the places to be filled.

It is to this end that the secretary proposes to maintain agents of the immigration bureau abroad, much after the methods of maintaining commercial attaches in foreign lands.

These agents would be kept advised, under the secretary's plan, of the labor needs of industry in this country, and from the list of prospective immigrants in the hands of the immigration attaching the best available men abroad would be picked and brought to this country. The plan contemplates removal of the alien's entire family, which in itself, the secretary feels, would remove one of the greatest evils of the present system, the effect of which requires the alien to come here and find employment before sending abroad for the remainder of his family.

One of the greatest advances the secretary believes possible under the present law was made recently when agents of the State, Treasury and Labor departments were sent abroad to establish in the Irish Free State, and later, if possible, in other countries, a system of inspection and examination of all-

ens abroad. This system, combined with a system of selecting immigrants abroad, Secretary Davis feels, would remove the two greatest problems of the immigration bureau.

### League Committee Scans Questions of International Law

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Suppression of piracy and the joint exploitation of the riches of the sea are among the ten first subjects selected for study by the League of Nations Committee on the Codification of International Law, of which the Swedish Ex-Premier Hjalmar Hammarskjold is the president and George W. Wickersham of New York a member. This committee was appointed by the league's assembly last fall upon the motion of Baron Marks von Wurtemberg, then Swedish minister of foreign affairs and delegate at Geneva.

A summary of the work so far accomplished shows that the committee has not yet taken up the proposal favored by Senator Borah to outlaw war altogether. Neither has it considered the so-called rules of warfare, regarding that subject as too big and complicated for immediate discussion, nor has it entered upon the hardly less formidable topic of the rights of neutrals in war time, which includes the freedom of the sea.

The committee's procedure has been, President Hammarskjold said recently, to select a limited list of topics on which agreement among the governments seemed the most likely, hoping later to be able to enter upon the more controversial fields. This list includes, in addition to the subjects mentioned above, the following heads: Questions of the nationality of citizens of territorial waters, which would include the rights of "rum rones," the special privileges and immunities of diplomats, the status of government owned merchant ships, such as the American Leviathan; the international extradition of persons accused of crime; state responsibility for injuries inflicted on visiting foreigners; procedure at international conventions for negotiations of treaties; and an international statute of limitations.

For each of these subjects a special subcommittee has been named with instructions to make detailed studies and to obtain the opinions of recognized professional authorities. These reports to the committee as a whole will examine, and then obtain the opinions of the different governments as to what they might ultimately ratify.

## Sun Study Helps Science In Accurate Weather Forecasts

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The heat of the sun has a proven relation not only to changes in the earth's temperature, but to the variations in weather conditions in general. Smithsonian Institution scientists have decided after experiments covering a long period, to increase the dependability of their observations, the experts hope to establish within a few years stations in various parts of the world where data can be gathered.

Through a series of papers dealing with experiments of its astrophysical observatory, the institution says "researchers give clear proof of a connection between solar variations and weather changes, but show that the relation is a complex one."

Whether recent abnormal aspects of world-wide weather have been caused by solar conditions cannot be determined, because extended records of the past history of solar radiation are lacking.

Dr. C. G. Abbot, assistant secretary of the institution and the director of the astrophysical observatory, said that the changes can be predicted nearly a week in advance by looking at the sun through a telescope.

H. H. Clayton, who for several years was official forecaster of Argentina and recently has been collaborating with Dr. Abbot through study of the sun, has predicted with very fair accuracy, the actual daily temperature of New York City nearly a week in advance for more than a year.

For several years the work has been conducted from 150 observatories, one at Mount Harney, Calif., Arizona, and the other near Oajima in the inhospitable desert of Chile.

Both are in high arid locations. To increase the accuracy of the observations, improvements are being planned for the Chile station while the Arizona observatory is to be moved to a higher location on Table Mountain, California, near Los Angeles.

Stations in the eastern hemisphere are needed and Dr. Abbot will go to Asia this fall and with funds supplied by the National Geographic Society seek a desirable location for an observatory with Hohenstein as his first objective. Later he will go to southwest Africa in search of a probable site for an observatory there.

Since 1922, researches have been conducted under the most unusual solar conditions known to modern science through a marked long continuation in period in the amount of heat thrown out by the sun. Whereas the normal rate has been established as 1.94 calories per square centimeter per minute, this value, known as the solar constant, since 1922 has been as low as 1.90 or 2 per cent below normal. At present it is 1.90 and showing a tendency to rise. The phenomenal heat was first announced by Dr. Abbot in April, 1922, and he then pronounced that departures of some sort from normal weather conditions might be expected.

Dr. Clayton says that changes in the sun's heat almost immediately affect the barometer and the thermometer in western Canada, and western United States, perhaps as a reaction from the tropical atmosphere, traveling with the velocity of sound. The atmospheric waves thus set up drift slowly south and west, and three days later are observed at New York City. Strangely enough it has been shown that it is not an increase, but a decrease of solar heating that makes it warmer in the east.
