Business Men Can Stop Rum Flow, Says Speaker
PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—If business men would boycott bootleggers the eighteenth amendment would soon be enforceable, said Stanley B. Vandervell of Boston, in an address at the thirtieth International Christian Endeavor convention.
"Many business men who expect their employees to respect the laws of this country are purchasers of bootleg liquors, and all intoxicating liquor by reason of the prohibition laws are in that class," said Mr. Vandervell. "Without the buying power of the men with money who scoff at the prohibition laws back of them, the bootleggers could not exist. Boycott bootleggers would be a good slogan for the business men to adopt and put into practice."

Prussia to Get Busoni Collection
BERLIN (AP)—The widow of Ferruccio Busoni has declared her intention of bequeathing to the Prussian state the entire Busoni archive, comprising all letters, autographs, musical scores of the late master. A special feature of this gift is a rare collection of original Liszt manuscripts and scores which Busoni collected with the utmost pains in the course of many years.

Soviet Heads Say French Forces Outnumber Red Army

WASHINGTON (AP)—The 3,000 Army of Soviet Russia is 133,000 less than the armed forces of France and 17,000 less than the combined strength of Poland, Rumania and the Baltic states, says the report of M. V. Pruzan, commander of the Soviet army and navy. The report, a copy of which has been received at the Russian Information Bureau here, was made by Kravyn, the successor of Trotsky at the recent Congress of Soviets at Moscow.
The Soviet army of 323,000 men, says the report, represents an average of 41 soldiers for each 10,000 of population, while on the same basis Rumania and Poland each have 100 soldiers, and France, exclusive of colonies, 200. The Soviet naval roster is given as 22,000, making the combined armed forces 592,000.
Great Russians form 64 per cent of the army; Ukrainians, 22 per cent; White Russians, four per cent; other Soviet nationalities, 10 per cent. More than 30 per cent of the officers are graduates of military colleges, the report declares.
Morale Low.
As to the morale of the army, the report says the desertions this year have been only one-tenth of one per cent as against 71 per cent in 1922.
Twenty per cent of the army recruits are illiterate, but the illiteracy is liquidated during the period of service. In 1924, there were taught 23,421 totally illiterate and 22,747 partially illiterate soldiers.

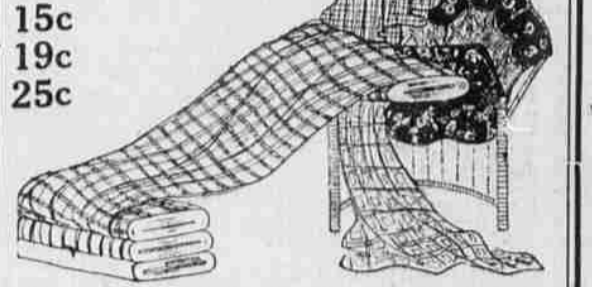

Bandon Hospital Move Starts
BANDON Ore.—An organization has been formed here to raise \$25,000 by public subscription to take over the American Legion building and convert it into a modern hospital. It is planned to accept an offer from the national hospital board of the Methodist Episcopal church of America to take over the hospital and operate it, making it one of a chain of 29 or more hospitals operated in the United States. The local institution will have 50 individual patient rooms, in addition to kitchen, dining room and operating room.

French Life-Savers Rewarded
PEACAMP, France (AP)—A Carnegie prize has been awarded to the Peacamp life-saving station, and silver and bronze plaques have been given to the captain and the crew of the Peacamp lifeboat.
Last February during a storm the Danish ship Nordstjernen, disabled and unable to make port, was in a critical situation. The Peacamp life-boat at great risk put to sea and saved every man on board the Danish ship.

German Bill Would Bar Baby Actors Appearing on Screen
BERLIN (AP)—Children under three years of age will not be permitted to appear in moving picture films, if a bill introduced in the Reichstag becomes a law.
The bill points out that the nervous and physical strain of facing bright lights or movie studios is injurious to infants. The bill further provides that children between three and 14 years may not appear in films except by permit of police and school authorities.

PREDICTS WAR WITH RUSSIA

TOKYO (AP)—Count Michimasa Toyama, member of the House of Peers and a noted Japanese publisher, who left recently for the United States to deliver a series of lectures at the international roundtable conference at the University of Chicago, is of the opinion that Japan, within the next ten years, is likely to go to war, not with America, but with Russia in Manchuria. He so expressed himself recently in an interview.
"War between America and Japan on the Pacific is physically impossible," said Count Toyama, "on account of the great distance which separates the countries, even if there were cause for war. But war with Russia is not only possible but probable. Japan made a big mistake in extending recognition to the Soviet government. Despite their solemn pledges to the contrary, the Russians are doing their best to spread communist propaganda in Japan and Korea, just as they have been doing in China. They have failed to succeed in China and they will also fail in Japan. The family system here is a splendid bulwark against communism."
"Russia is pursuing a policy in China every bit as imperialistic as that of the former China. The Chinese, blinded by their resentment against Japan because of the mistake this nation has made, do their best to spread communist propaganda in Japan and Korea, just as they have been doing in China. They have failed to succeed in China and they will also fail in Japan. The family system here is a splendid bulwark against communism."
