

MANY ANIMALS SLAIN BY CARS

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—The trail of tragedy lurking for domestic animals in the wake of the automobile is being relieved by science and veterinary surgeons say, by an awakened human sympathy for suffering pets. Dallas has six cat and dog hospitals, doing work representative of what is transpiring

in other cities throughout the country. The hazards of the road are taking their toll among dogs and cats no less than among their masters. While surgeons may be working to save human life, others are working no less earnestly to save humbler but still precious lives. The heaviest damage is done on Sundays. Dr. W. G. Brock, who maintains two animal hospitals here, treats from eight to a dozen dogs nearly every Sunday. No longer must a dog forfeit his life just because he has the misfortune to suffer a broken leg. A bullet in the head formerly was his fate. Now the leg is set or even amputated. Animal operations are almost as

varied as human. They include mastoid operations, operations for relief of hernia, removal of gallstones, tumors and eyes. The Caesarian operation, and removal of an organ similar to man's appendix. Another common operation is extraction of foreign bodies from the stomach, such as rubber balls and rocks which have been swallowed.

It is a common experience at animal hospitals to have motorists carry in the lump form of a dog that has been struck, asking the surgeon to save its life. Motorist and dog may be strangers.

The modern animal hospital is planned not unlike the human hospital. They have a fully equipped operating room, a medicine dispensary, with almost all kinds of medicine, a surgical ward, an observation ward, and one for contagious diseases, and a boarding department. At this time of the year, the clipping department is rushed. One hospital keeps two attendants clipping dogs at the hot season.

All animal workers urge people at this time of year to set out pans of water for the animals. In the case of dogs and cats it prevents great suffering and after avoids what sometimes is erroneously taken for cases of "rabies."

New Method Tried by Police Chief to Catch Auto Bandits

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Payroll bandits and other hold-up men who use automobiles to escape after downtown robberies are finding it harder to get away due to a system installed by Thomas Healy, new chief of police. Under the rule when a policeman discovers lawbreakers escaping in a machine he blows a long blast and four short ones on his whistle and nearby traffic officers stop all vehicles until further notice.

Payroll robberies have been common here this summer, averaging almost one a week and it was because of these crimes and the recent robbery of a jeweler's messenger of \$20,000 in gems as he came out of a downtown bank vault that the experiment was tried.

Grain Market Continues Its Downward trend; Prospects Up

WASHINGTON (Special)—Favorable crop conditions at home and abroad forced grain prices downward on a nervous market during the week ending June 27th, according to the weekly grain market review of the United States department of agriculture. Wheat prices stiffened early in the week on claims of rust damage to the spring wheat crop, but sagged again with denial of serious damage. Export bids for new crop wheat in the southwest were below a working basis although there was a good inquiry for mid wheat for quick shipment and export sales for the week were about 2,000,000 bushels.

The world's supply of wheat decreased during May and the world's commercial stocks decreased about 53,000,000 bushels. Shipments from the Southern Hemisphere are of fair volume and the exports from the United States have been somewhat heavier than statistics indicated, but country marketings in Canada have been larger than was expected and commercial stocks in that country show only a small decrease while shipments from India have recently been much larger than were suggested by the crop report for that country. Trade reports continue to indicate European stocks as light, but favorable crop conditions there may make buyers cautious about accumulating stocks of imported grain.

European conditions continue to show improvement over a year ago, while Canadian conditions are very favorable with moisture sufficient for several weeks and plant growth more advanced than usual. Recent rains caused some improvement in the northern wheat areas of the United States and the spring wheat crop made satisfactory progress, although there were some complaints of too much moisture in Minnesota, while plants were heading short in some localities in the Dakotas.

Cash wheat at Minneapolis declined with futures, although some premiums were slightly higher. Northwestern mills were buying some high protein hard winter wheat for June-July shipment. Twelve per cent No. 1 hard northern sold 11 to 16c over the July price, 12 1/2 per cent, 15 to 19c over and 13 per cent 19 to 24c over the July.

There was a good demand for the light offerings of choice milling wheat at Chicago and the first car of new wheat arrived Friday, two weeks earlier than last year. The movement of new wheat increased at Kansas City, where about half of the arrivals there were of the new crop. New arrivals were of unusually high protein content, averaging fully a point to a point and a half higher than a year ago, and there was considerable narrowing in the margin between the old and new wheat. Southwestern mills were not accumulating large stocks, evidently waiting for lower premiums. Twelve percent protein No. 2 hard winter sold 14 to 15c over the July price, 12 1/2 per cent, 17 to 19c over and 12 per cent, 18 to 20c over the July, while the new wheat with 12 per cent protein sold about 3c over the July, 12 1/2 per cent 8 to 9c over and 14 per cent 10c over.

Sharp Gain. Soft red winter wheat was sharply higher at St. Louis, where the first car of new wheat graded No. 2 red winter and sold at \$1.25. No. 2 red winter old crop was selling at \$1.25 but this grade moved at Cincinnati at \$1.31 to \$1.32 with a good demand for quick shipment to southern and nearby mills on account of low stocks.

The corn market was sharply low with a big improvement in crop conditions. Moisture was sufficient and temperatures were favorable for promoting rapid growth, although rainfall was insufficient in most of the southern states. Country marketings have been liberal in view of the light supplies upon farms, although the June report of the department shows only 15 per cent less plus saved than a year ago. There were 28 per cent brood sows bred, but largely on account of favorable weather in March and April

open countries continued generally favorable and prices declined slightly. Californian and Chilean malting barley sold at London at \$3.63 to \$2.35 per cwt. while British fine malting barley brought \$3.69 to \$2.91 per 100 pounds. The flax market was sharply lower although crop news was mixed. The demand for linseed oil was slow without much new business, although oil moved out freely. The Argentine surplus continues to move slowly with only a fair European demand and a small amount of Argentine flaxseed continued to arrive at New York.

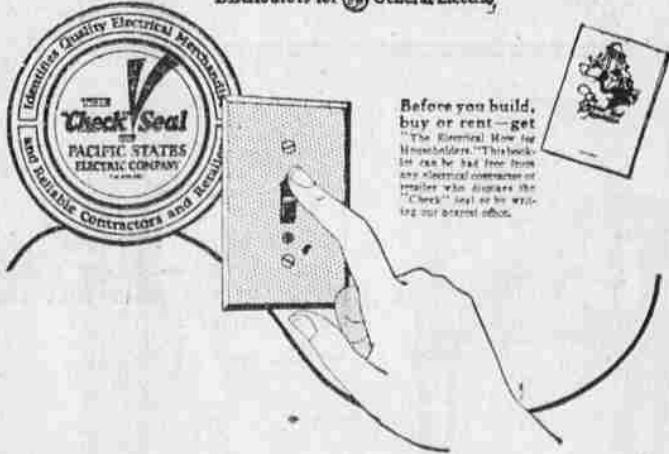
