

CROP OUTLOOK IS PROMISING

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—The weather has been quite warm in this section for the past several days. A number of thunder storms visited portions of the county during the past week, but only a small amount of rain fell in this section. The ground in the dry farming sections of the county is still in fine condition for growing crops, which are coming along rapidly. The fall wheat is beginning to show signs of turning in many of the early sown fields. The cutting of grain hay will begin during the next week or ten days.

A number of the farmers in the valley sections have been busy the past week shelling their first crop of alfalfa. Others whose crops were apparently somewhat later, are starting the cutting at this time. The weather of the past two weeks has been fine for curing the hay out.

Many of the farmers in the hill sections are still busy working their summerfallow, killing the weeds which are coming thick in places. Farmers state that this has been the best season they have experienced in a number of years for getting the foul stuff to germinate well on the summerfallow fields, and expect to make a good clean-up on many of the fields which are infested with weeds.

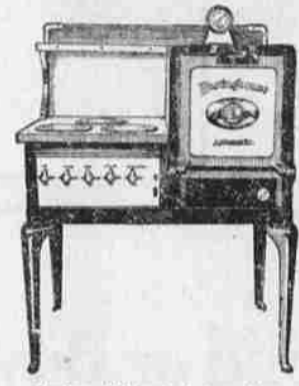

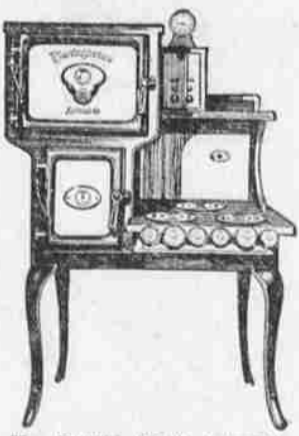
