No discussion of the information involved. When second hand doublers one no-trump and his partner passes, the latter indicates that he can defeat the no-trump bid.

(a) Suppose the dealer bids one no-trump, second hand doubles and the dealer's partner redoubles. Is that redouble intended as a business redouble or is it merely a bluff?

(b) Suppose the dealer bids one no-trump, second hand doubles, third and fourth hand pass and the dealer redoubles. Is that redouble intended as a business redouble or is it merely a bluff?

(c) Suppose the dealer bids one no-trump, second and third hand pass, fourth hand doubles and the dealer redoubles. Is that redouble intended as a business redouble or is it merely a bluff?

Table with 4 columns: Hearts, Clubs, Diamonds, Spades. Values range from 1-5.

There are no trumps and Z is in the lead. How can Y-Z win five of the eight tricks against any defense?

(1) B can lead the ten of diamonds. If he makes this lead, Z wins with the queen and returns the suit, thereby setting up his small diamond. He still has the king of clubs so he can make the last diamond and thereby score five tricks.

(2) B can lead the ten of spades. If he makes this lead, Z should play a low spade and Y should win it with the king and return the diamond. Z should play the queen and return the suit, thereby setting up a small diamond and having the king of clubs for a re-entry.

(3) B can lead the ten of clubs. If he makes this lead, Z should win the trick and lead the queen of diamonds. He should then lead the ten of hearts which Y should win and return forcing A in the lead with the ten of hearts.

JAP SCHOOLS TO CONTEST HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE LAW HONOLULU (AP).—Revision of regulations adopted by the territorial school commission appears to have made no material change in the attitude of the 25 litigating Japanese language schools.

The 25 schools are inactive, having closed their doors to avoid being fined for non-payment of the annual fee at the rate of \$1.50 a pupil. There is in preparation a suit to void the territorial ordinance from enforcing the law, as amended by the legislature of 1925.

Thirty schools having complied with the territorial requirements are operating.

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
