**2 BRIDGES TO BE BUILT.**

PENDLETON, Ore.—The county engineer was authorized to prepare specifications and to advertise for bids for contracts for the construction of two bridges across the Umatilla river when the county court met.

One of the bridges will be located at Echo and the other at Stanfield. The Echo bridge will consist of four 50-foot spans, 20 feet of width, and will be of concrete construction. The Stanfield bridge will consist of two 20-foot spans, will be 18 feet wide, and will be a steel structure. The bridges will both be completed by fall, according to present plans.

## CLOUDBURST CLOSES ROAD

ENTERPRISE, Ore. (Special to the Observer)—The Leap road up the George D. Wood hill is still impassable and residents of the district to the north have to detour several miles to get to Lostine. The road was washed out last week Monday by a tremendous cloudburst which did wonders in the way of giving rocks and earth, states a local newspaper.

A few rods above the Wallowa river bridge the grade was gashed by a cut which carried out all earth clear down to bedrock. At several places farther up the hill, the sides of the old grade were sheared off sharp, leaving an abrupt drop of several feet to the rocks. For a mile or so, the roadway is strewn with huge boulders swept down from the hills by the torrent.

The upper part of the road, the new grade constructed jointly by the county and Leap farmers under the supervision of P. L. Itam-es, escaped injury, as it lies high enough to get comparatively little wash from the hills and ravines. The ditch at the side of the new grade was filled and the road was strewn with coarse gravel and small rocks, but there was no real damage.

A county road crew, under R. L. Whitmore, Lostine supervisor, is now working to reopen the road up the hill. The chasm will be filled and the dangerous places at each side of the grade will also be filled and the rocks cleared away.

The cloudburst is described by Mr. Wood, whose home is near the top of the hill, as a most extraordinary storm. It was not any more rain, nor did the water simply come down "in sheets." It descended in what seemed to be a solid mass and each hillside was a raging river. The catches bear evidence of the tremendous power of the water, with every loose rock carried away and the vegetation flattened out.
